Koslovsky Tells Of Russian Revolt

HELSINGFORS, March 22.—General Koslovsky, leader of the Russian revolutionaries, who were forced to evacuate Kronstadt before the repeated assaults of the Bolsheviks, gave an account of the rising today.

On March 2, he declared, the Kronstadt Government informed the Petrograd authorities it did not recognize the Soviet Government. The Soviet commissaries and leaders of the fleet were arrested, and a committee of sailors and workmen elected. Former officers offered their services, and March 3 a Kronstadt Soviet was formed. The military members proposed an attack on Oranienbaum, on the Gulf of Finland opposite Kronstadt, but the provisional committee refused, and the garrison began the defence of the fortress. The hostile attacks became fiercer and fiercer daily, General Koslovsky said, and yesterday the garrison, unable to repulse them longer, was forced to retire. Finnish guards at Teroki have been ordered to collect the weapons discarded by refugees arriving in Finland, including 10,000 rifles. Five thousand of the revolutionaries have crossed the Finnish frontier, and the number is expected to exceed 15,000. Revolutionary cavalry is maintaining the morale, and good discipline in the infantry is noticeable. The refugees are being marshalled in military order.

If Germany Pays Problem Is Solved

France Said to be Bearing Colossal Burdens Left by War

PARIS, March 22.—If Germany pays, France will emerge from her financial difficulties, notwithstanding the colossal burdens left by the war; if she does not pay the problem is insoluble.

This statement was made in the Senate today by Harry Cheron in presenting the Senate Finance Committee report on the 1921 budget. The French debt which in August, 1924 stood at 27 billion francs he explained, amounted on March 1 of this year to 307 billion francs to which must be added in the future pensions and war damages estimated at another 218 billion francs.

France, thus far, said M. Cheron had put out 38 billion francs on there would be 180 billion francs more with interest to be added to her obligations if Germany did not pay.

FIRM FAILS FOR SIX MILLIONS

Former Governor Benjamin Odell and former Judge Van Vleeten Odell have been appointed receivers for Gaston, Williams & Wigmore, exporters and importers, Boston. The liabilities of the firm were given as approximately \$6,000,000. The assets consist of stock in twenty-five subsidiary companies located all over the world. The largest of these is Gaston, Williams & Wigmore Ltd., steamship owners, of Canada. Heavy losses were understood to have been sustained when the Soviet government repudiated claims the company had for supplies.

WILL SPEND A MILLION ON EDUCATION

The estimates of the Ottawa Collegiate Institute and the Public School Board will total nearly \$1,000,000, announced Dr. J. H. P. Putman, public school inspector. Eighty per cent of this amount will go in teachers' salaries, while 10 per cent will go to interest on sinking fund, etc. Roughly, the amount will be divided as follows: Collegiate, \$281,000; public schools, \$761,000.

BILL TO TAX PROFITS

A tax of one per cent on gross profits of all incorporated companies operating in Manitoba is to be brought before the House at an early date by the provincial treasurer in the form of an amendment to the Corporation Taxation Act. This form of taxation is expected to bring in an additional revenue of \$375,000. The province faces a deficit of approximately \$500,000 on current expenditures for 1921. This is the reason given by a member of the Government for the proposed new taxation.
