WHAT PROGRESS?

The last words of Hon. Andrew G. Blair, spoken to a friend and apparently without the knowledge that they were his last words, were, "What progress have you made to-day? Whether conscious or not of the supreme crisis in which he spoke, the words were worthy of the great occasion. It is a question fitting to be asked by every man and woman when the evening shadows close upon the day's activities. It is fitting to be asked by every one when approaching the close of life's day, whether it may have been long or short.

Leaving that aspect of the question for the time to the contemplation and exposition of the preacher and the moralist, we turn to ask what progress are we making in the solution of those great and vital problems that confront our Island State? And it would seem to the writer of these lines that a valuable lesson may be learned from the public life of the great man whose last words we are briefly considering.

Mr. Blair from his first entry upon political life in New Brunswick was a non-partisan leader down to his retirement in 1896. His fine talents made him leader of the Opposition as soon as he obtained his seat. He immediately sought and obtained a following among both Liberals and Conservatives, fully believing that the interests of his Province could be best served by a composite party neither allied nor opposed to either of the great parties in Dominion affairs.

At the end of four years he defeated the Government of the day and became leader of a new Administration. He, himself a Liberal, became Premier and Attorney General. Mr. Elder, Provincial Secretary was a Liberal, as was Mr. Bitchie, the Solicitor General, while Mr. Mitchell, Surveyor General and Mr. Ryan, Commissioner of Public Works were Conservatives and the four members without portfolio were divided between the two parties. At a later date, in 1895, three of the five portfolios were held by Conservatives and two by Liberals. When Mr. Blair resigned the Premiership to become Minister of Railways, Mr. Mitchell, Conservative, became Premier, with both Liberal and Conservative colleagues, about equally divided.

Thus for thirteen years under Mr. Blair's leadership the Province was ruled by a union of men of both parties. Patronage was divided among supporters of the Administration and some Liberal and some Conservative journals were found supporting, while other Liberal and Conservative journals were opposing the Government. When a federal election came round Mr. Blair and Mr. Elder were active in the Liberal cause, and their Conservative colleagues none the less active in the Conservative cause. It was thus in the federal elections of 1887, 1891 and 1896 and these differences in regard to federal matters never disturbed the harmony between Mr. Blair and his colleagues in provincial affairs.

Close and intimate connection with the Government of New Brunswick in those days as a journalistic supporter during the entire period, and a close observation of our Island affairs during eleven years past under the party system, has profoundly convinced the writer of these lines that New Brunswick fared better under the composite system than

we are faring under the party system. New Brunswick never had more prestige or more influence at Ottawa than during that period. All our party fighting in provincial affairs is doing us no good. Is it not, indeed, doing us great harm, dividing our counsel, weakening our efforts and delaying our progress?

We come now to the question with which we began this article. What progress have we made, are we making in the matters most vitally affecting the welfare of our Province. We have made no progress in the past two years, are making no progress today? Is not the time ripe for an Island party, a party neither Liberal nor Conservative, or made up of both Liberals and Conservatives, the best men of both, men who will place the Island before party, work energetically and strive manfully for our rights?

We believe that a number of our best and ablest public men are ready to take this stand, and that when they do so the country will rally to their support. We have before outlined this proposal. We repeat it today because the urgency is greater than ever before. We present it enforced by the name of a great man and the great and successful example of a sister Province. We present it to the thinking men of Prince Edward Island as a means by which a united people can best work out their commercial, industrial and political salvation. Think it over.

THE GOVERNMENT AND THE TELEGRAPH

We have been for a good while seized of certain information as to the relations of the Ottawa Government with the Anglo-American Telegraph Company. The company is a very wealthy one, owning a number of trans-Atlantic and other cables and extensive landlines. Its directors and leading shareholders are influential in the London money market, where all the world goes borrowing. The Dominion will be forced by many maturing loans, and to get the money to build the Transcontinental Railway, to renew and borrow to the extent of over \$200,000,000 within the next few years. A word from the big financiers of the Anglo-American to the effect that Canada had not treated them quite right would be a wet blanket for the Finance Minister when he goes borrowing to England.

In other words, the Government knows full well that while the Anglo-American has a certain exclusive right on the Island, it has no monopoly at all of the telegraphic communication between his Province and the other Provinces and the outside world. The Finance Minister knows this but is afraid to say so for fear of the telegraph company! That is the real secret of the situation. The Government must first consult the agent of the Anglo-American and make terms with him before we shall get any wireless messages. It seems to me that the truth was told in this matter, and why we are left to suffer as we are.
