Yankees Need But One More Win To Clinch Title

American League Champs Down Hubbell & Mates 5-2 Before Crowd Of 66,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 4—(AP)—Not even the hitherto invincible Carl Hubbell could silence the heavy artillery of the Yankees today, with the result the lingering world series hopes of the Giants came tumbling down with the shattered remains of the celebrated southpaw's winning streak.

Before an overflow crowd of 66,689 fans at the Yankee stadium, shattering all series attendance records for the second straight day, the American League Champions beat Hubbell and the Giants 5-2 for their third straight conquest and moved rapidly in the direction of the world championship.

The home run king of the majors, Captain Henry Louis Gehrig of the Yankees, beat the king of the southpaw pitchers with a home run into the right-field bleachers in the third inning.

This circuit clout, with Red Rolfe on base, climaxed an attack that produced four runs in two innings and clinched the ball game.

GAVE EIGHT HITS

Far from the peak of effectiveness he reached in halting the Yankees on opening day, Hubbell was battered for eight hits in the seven frames he worked before giving way to a pinch-hitter. The great southpaw lacked his customary control, and his screwball held none of the baffling mysteries for the Yankee Murderers' Row that it did last Wednesday.

Thus the Yankees, who had their own world series streak of 12 consecutive games broken by Hubbell, got ample revenge by handing the ace of the Giants his first setback since last July 13. The slender Oklahoman had rolled up 17 consecutive triumphs.

Behind the highly effective right-hand speedball flinging of Monte Pearson, who took the spotlight after recovering from a lame back, the Yankees took almost complete command of New York's baseball war.

Leading now by three games to one, the American League Champions need only one more victory to clinch their four world series in successive tries.

The Yankees will send their burly right-hander, Red Ruffing, after the clinching at the Stadium tomorrow while the Giants will pin their fluttering chances on the right-handed "sinker" ball delivery of Hal Schumacher. Both were beaten in their first starts. Ruffing lost to Hubbell in the opener. Schumacher was routed in the second game.

RECORD ATTENDANCE

Today's crowd bettered the high mark of 64,842 in paid attendance, set yesterday when the Yanks won 2-1, the total receipts of \$240,591 surpassed the one-day record of \$235,108.

The aggregate for the first four games, as well as the players' pool, also set new records. Total receipts thus far amount to \$832,818, from the ticket sales, exclusive of an additional \$100,000 collected from the sale of radio rights.

This surpasses the previous high of \$783,217 set in 1927.

The aggregate "cut" to be split by the players of the contending clubs, as well as by the second, third and fourth place outfits in each major league, soared to \$424,737.78. This wipes out the previous mark of \$419,736.60 established in 1928.

Breaks Give Yankees Win In Third Game

NEW YORK, Oct. 4—(AP)—The greatest crowd in world series history, 64,842 fans who filled the expansive Yankee Stadium nearly to capacity, saw the Yankees capitalize the breaks of the third game in New York's baseball war Saturday to beat the Giants 2-1 despite the spectacular four-hit hurling of Fred Fitzsimmons, 35 year old chicken farmer and exponent of the baffling knuckle ball.

Fitzsimmons, rated one of the best fielding pitchers in baseball, lost a heart-breaking duel to his right-handed rival, Irving "Bump" Hadley because he failed to hold a sharply hit grounder by Frankie Crossetti in the critical climax of the eighth inning rally.

Home runs into the right-field stands by Lou Gehrig, the Yankee captain and Jimmy Ripple, freshman centerfielder of the Giants from Montreal, carried the most exciting match of the series all square into the eighth inning before the last of a series of tough breaks turned against the National League Champions.

The lead-off man of the Yankees, Frankie Crossetti, doubled to right as the third inning began. Rolfe poked a single scoring the shortstop, Joe Dimaggio fouled out but Hubbell suddenly lost his usual calm and control while pitching to Gehrig.

With the count two and one, Hubbell let loose a wild pitch. Rolfe ran to third.

The Yankee Captain took a full swing, caught the next pitch solidly and smashed it half-way up the open right-field stands.

It was Gehrig's second home run of the series, and it won the ball game. The Yankees didn't score again off Hubbell, although they threatened in the seventh.

GEHRIG SCORED

The fifth and final Yankee run was manufactured off the relief pitching of Frank Gabler, in the eighth, when Gehrig doubled down the right field foul line, went to third on an infield out and scored on Powell's single.

Meantime, Pearson dazzled the Giants with his curves and fast ball. Monte scattered the seven Giant safeties and fanned seven, including Manager Terry twice.

The Giants broke into the scoring in the fourth. Dick Bartell led off with a single. Terry walked but Ott hit into a force play at second.

Bartell ran to third and trotted home on Jimmy Ripple's single through the infield to left.

Pam Barton, Youthful British Golf Champion, Captures U. S. Title

SUMMIT, N.J., Oct. 4—(AP)—

"When man falls destiny sends a woman, and a woman never falls."

That was the story Saturday as 19-year-old Pamela Barton, of London, reigning British titleholder, won the 40th United States women's golf championship and became the second woman in history to win both major titles in one year.

Miss Barton, plump, titian-haired, and always smiling conquered the veteran Maureen Orcutt Crews of Coral Gables, Fla., 4 and 3, in 33 holes.

She dashed the hopes of the 28-year-old American with a two under par performance on the last 17 holes on Canoe Brook country club's soft and slow course.

By her triumph Miss Barton equalled the "double" scored by Dorothy Campbell, now Mrs. Hurd, in 1909 and kept alive a long tradition—every foreigner who ever reached the final has won.

Miss Barton won by seizing opportunities that Maureen wasted in the morning, particularly on the first nine, and on the might of her superior stroking and boldness.

The break came at the 18th. A drive and a brassie carried Pam's ball to the foot of the sharp hill leading up to the 477-yard 18th.

She chipped up just off the carpet—47 feet from the cup. Maureen, meanwhile, had hooked her drive close to the boundary and was in the rough back of the green in four.

Pam chipped up half way to the hole and the ball rolled in for a birdie 4 and the lead. Maureen turned white. She never recovered.

The freckle-faced London lass smiled her brightest smile, and well she might. That dividend-paying chip furnished her with the impetus to put the match on ice later.

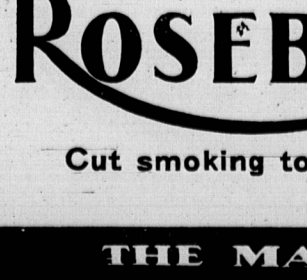
