RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY CHURCH "All religions offers a way to peace but Christianity is pre-eminently a religion of joy," declared Rev. Hugh Miller at the morning worship in Trinity, taking for his theme "Radiant Religion". Evidence of this joy is found in the number and content of the hymns of the Church, the lives of those in intimate fellowship with God and in the New Testament, especially the story of the first Christians.

The Church today has been charged with having lost this radiance through lost faith, spiritual declension and sudden apostasy. Hence the necessity of the prayer of the Psalmist - "Restore unto me the joy of thy salvation". Many a man has been tried - reckless abandon of restraint and self-sufficiency.

The man of sorrow was the man of joy. In the bond of fellowship, love and faith He revealed His secret of joy.CORDS that are broken will revivitate once more.

The evening sermon was based on the words in Acts: "And the rest some on board and some on broken pieces of the ship, and so it came to pass that they all escaped safely to land." They were regarded as words of encouragement and rebuke. In every congregation there are those who long for encouragement. Life is hard, an despair threatens. Aspirations have faded and the unexpected happens. These the preacher must always give words of encouragement and cheer. Much can be made of remnants.

Rebuke is also needed. We are too easily satisfied with remnants. We touch the hem of His garment. God demands the whole, and as Christ He has made it possible.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH Notwithstanding the dull disagreeable weather there was a splendid congregation at St. James' Church on Sunday morning. A number of visitors being in attendance. The acting minister the Rev. Dr. J. Kier Fraser preached an eloquent sermon from James 1, 24. "He beholdeth himself." It was very necessary and desirable, he said that the average man should stop from time to time and consider what sort of a man he is and to what he's indebted for the progress he has made and the privileges he

enjoys. He showed how much one was indebted for the influence and example of his father and mother for the benefits of a christian home and upbringing, for the services of the church; for being born in a christian country; for being the product of a christian race whose ideals were those of the Gospels of the Gospel of Christ.

There were many other blessings one could realize he enjoyed and should be thankful for. He were simply from time to time to stop for a little and realize himself. At the evening service Rev. Dr. Fraser delivered another able sermon on the subject of "Some Unknown Blessings". He took for his text St. Mark 9th chap. 24th verse. "If any man desired to be first, he shall be last of all and be called specifically to the person of the mothers of great men."

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH The services at the Central Christian Church were conducted by the Minister, the Rev. S. C. Cooper. The morning service and the Sunday School meetings were combined with an illustrated sermon suitable for both young and old. The text was in John's Gospel, Chapter 3, "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness even so must the Son of Man be lifted up."

The attendance at the Sunday School period had an increase of over 50 per cent. The two services were completed together in about an hour and 20 minutes and seemed to meet with universal approval. Short interesting talks and sermons will be given during the summer months work, and parents can feel free to come and bring the children as the two services will last little longer than an hour and fifteen minutes.

The evening sermon was a fine gospel message on 2 Kings, 5, 11, 13. "Does Jesus Care was sung as a chorale and also "I Pays to Serve Jesus" as a mixed quartette. The exercises of the day were enjoyed by large congregations.

ST. DUNSTON'S BASILICA Masses were celebrated at St. Dunstan's Basilica yesterday at the usual hours. Rev. Father McCabe was celebrated at the 9.30 Mass and Rev. 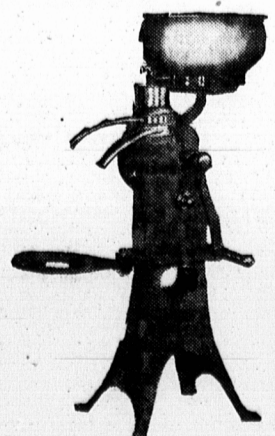
