MAIL COURSE IN HORSEBACK RIDING LATEST

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo.—Shades of all the old-time buckaroos! Shades of all the ripsnorting broncho busters and all the untamed mustangs. The Curtain falls on the Wild and Woolly West. Riding now is included in the "How To" series. The Eastern "dude" sneaks out to the West and learns the cowboys' tricks in a week. It's not far but it's true. An old cowboy down near Cody sobbed himself to sleep last week as there came to his attention "Notes on Riding," issued for the edification of "Dudes" by a famous Dude Ranch near Yellowstone National Park.

"Pretty soon those Wall Street birds will be running us out of our jobs," he said.

But the Dudes got a lot of good out of it, and catechized each other on the fine points of horsemanship.

"The boys at the corral will be furnished in the 'Notes' as follows:

"The 'inside dope' on riding as glad to show you how to tie your horse properly. If stopping anywhere for several hours, please do not forget about feed and water.

"Approach your horse slowly, quietly and always to his left shoulder. Keep away from his heels. Lead your horse a few steps before mounting—this is the common custom.

"Mount and dismount only on the left side of the horse. These movements require care and attention and both are best accomplished through exercise of good balance rather than strength of arms. Do not mount without a firm grip on the reins, and never release them while riding except to change from hand to hand.

"After a little practice, spurs or a quirt are desirable in the riding equipment and the horses are generally accustomed to them. Both, however, should be used with judgment. Do not strike your horse over the head or neck, but always on the flank. A very common error of beginners is to strike the horse to urge him ahead, and at the same time pull up on the reins, which is the only signal he knows to "stop." The western saddle horses are not familiar with the use or meaning of "whoa" or "get up."

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IS RETURNING TO FLORIDA.—Dr. Anne Young, of Tallahassee, Florida, who has been visiting her old home at Pinette for the past few weeks, was in the city yesterday and left this morning on return to the States. ENCOURAGING DAIRY SITUATION.—Mr. J. T. Profit, Secretary, Provincial Dairyman's Association was in the City yesterday. He speaks encouragingly of the dairy situation in this province for the present year. The make this season so far is in excess of last year owing to the continued rains and moisture in the grazing lands. The Kensington Dairy Association also handled during the month of July 1,999,824 lbs. of milk. The cheese market has also greatly improved—this date a year ago, cheese was selling at about 15 cents per lb. today, 22 cents is being offered. The official grading of cheese will eventually solve the problem of the overripe milk menace. The difference of about five cents per 100 lbs. milk between first and second grade cheese should arouse dairymen to greater interest in the care of milk to be delivered at the factory. This matter is of serious concern and will inevitably lead to the grading of milk as well as to the protection of the patron who takes the care necessary to produce a first grade product.

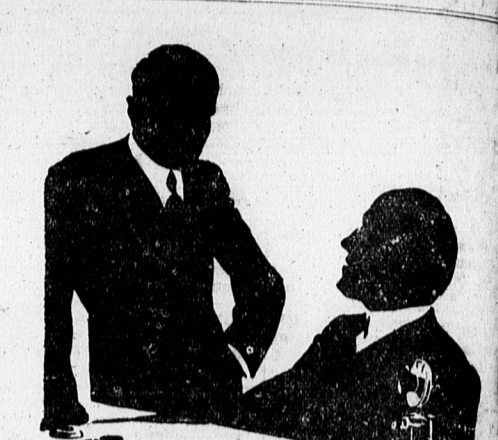

NOTED GERMANS IN MEXICO FOR STUDY OF SOLAR ECLIPSE

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 30.—A party of German scientists, headed by Prof. H. Ludendorff, director of the Potsdam Observatory and brother of the field marshal were the first of the foreign savants to arrive in Mexico to observe the solar eclipse on Sept. 19. After being welcomed by representatives of the government and inspecting the national observatory at Tacubaya, the party left for Yerbantz, Durango, where they will install their instruments.

In the party is Prof. B. Schorr, director of the Hamburg Observatory who, at the outbreak of the world war, was with Professor Ludendorff in the Crimea on the same mission that finds them in Mexico. They were forced to abandon all their instruments according to Schorr, and flee to Germany to avoid internment. Several months ago the professors travelled to Odessa and managed to bring the outfit, which is now being sent to Yerbantz for use in observing the coming eclipse.
