Doucette Case Adjudged After Five Testify

The adjourned preliminary hearing of Jeremiah Doucette, charged with wounding with intent to cause grievous bodily harm was resumed at the Police Court yesterday before Sirpendary Magistrate K. M. Martin.

Witness said she would sit on the steps and wait until he returned. It was about a quarter to twelve then, she said, she waited two hours and a half.

Mrs. Gertrude Dunn testified that she was acquainted with Jeremiah and Isidore Doucette and saw both of them on the evening of July 13th, at Catherine Doucette's, Galtown.
