Damages Against Canadian Northern

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(C. P. Cable) The judicial committee of the privy council today allowed an appeal of the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway Company, subsidiary of the Canadian National Railways, against decision of the British Columbia Supreme Court which ruled the Kapoor Lumber Company was entitled to damages arising from a fire the lumber company alleged was due to negligence of the railway.

Kapoor Lumber Co., Ltd., was awarded \$117,800 damages against the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway Co., a subsidiary of the Canadian National Railways, by the Supreme Court of British Columbia. The claim was for loss suffered on August 16, 1930, when its mill at Lapoor, 30 miles north of Victoria, B. C., was destroyed by fire.

The British Columbia court of appeal set aside the Supreme Court award and ordered a new trial. The railway asked and was given permission to take the case to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in an effort to get dismissal of the action without new trial.
