Freight Traffic Across Strait In December

A slight decrease in the number of carloads of freight for December 1948 ferried both to and from Prince Edward Island between Cape Tormentine, N.B., and the office of the superintendent, Canadian National Railways, Island Division, Charlottetown.

Carloads imported in December 1948 were 1,327 as against 1,401 in December 1947, and exported in December 1948, 1,145 as against 1,187 in 1947.
