Price Control Questions and Answers
Questions and Answers on Price Control will appear in The Guardian as a regular feature each day. The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board members. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee.
Q. Must I surrender meat coupons if I have deer meat given to me?
A. No. Venison meat is not rationed.
Q. Where do ex-servicemen obtain their food ration books?
A. At any local ration board office. However, it is advisable for them to apply to the board in their own home towns, since many applications at demobilization centers cause long queues and much delay.
Q. I have just received my fur coat from storage in a nearby city. They charged me fifty cents more for storage this year than I was charged in the same place last year. I didn't think this was allowed.
A. It is not allowed. Firms are not allowed to increase the charges for storing fur coats. If you will send the name of the firm who stores your coat to the nearest office of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board they will have the matter investigated for you.

Cook's Corner

TREASURE CHEST FRUIT CAKE

14 1/2 cups mixed chopped dried fruit
1 cup heavy jelly
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup bran flakes
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 teaspoons allspice
1 teaspoon mace
1 teaspoon ginger
3/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons brandy flavoring
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 cup prunes or grape juice
1 pound butter
2 1/2 cups sugar
8 eggs, well beaten
7 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon soda
3 teaspoons baking powder
Combine fruit with jelly, syrup, nutmeats, bran, spices, salt, flavorings and fruit juice; mix thoroughly and let stand while preparing batter. Blend butter and sugar thoroughly; add eggs and mix well. Sift flour with soda and baking powder and add half of it to the creamed mixture; beat well. Add fruit and mix thoroughly. Add remaining dry ingredients and stir thoroughly blended. Pour into pans lined with water paper. Bake in slow oven (300°) about 2 1/2 hours.

The Hair Brush
Keep the hair brush in a sanitary condition. To clean it, dip several times with back upward in warm water, to which a little household ammonia has been added. Do not rinse. This will stiffen the bristles and keep them from becoming soft. Place the brush on its back to dry. Silverback brushes should not be put into water.
