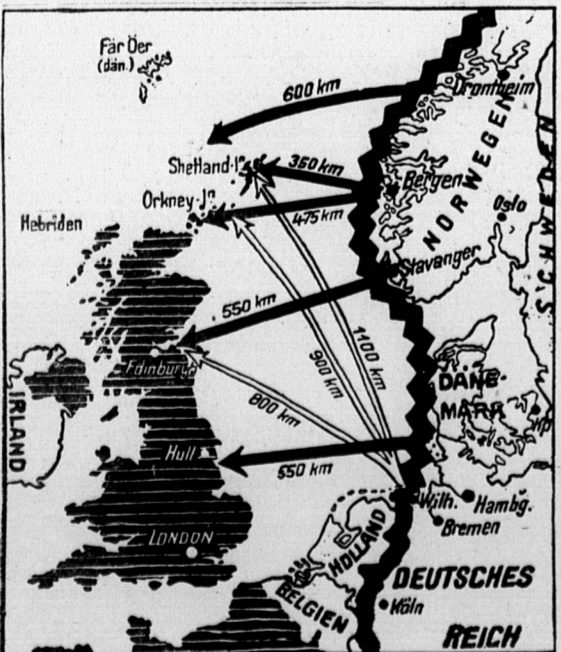

### Gandhi's Power To Sway Masses Holds Securely

(By G. E. POWELL) (Canadian correspondent) CALCUTTA, May 8—(CP)—Of all the speeches at the Congress Party conference in a Bihar jungle, only that of Mahatma Gandhi counts. Strangely enough he is not even a member of the Congress. In several speeches he made plain his policy, and therefore, that of the Congress. He said he wanted independence for India but would not precipitate a political campaign by the Hindus until the country was ready for it, and he had tried all means of reaching an agreement with the British government. Gandhi has the power to sway the masses and hold together the rival factions left after the virtual secession of Subhas Bose's "Forward Bloc." Congress socialists accent Gandhi's leadership as a unifying force, perhaps the only such force in the organization. "Compromise is in his very being and he will go to any lengths necessary to the victory to try for a settlement. He repeats what he has so often said in recent years—that the Congress party is not ready for a fight."

#### Faith in Principles

Without full faith in truth, non-violence and the charkha (spinning wheel) which is a symbol of economic independence, Congressmen cannot be his soldiers. He has made it clear that their truthfulness and belief in non-violence and the value of the charkha are far from reaching the standard which he prescribes. Save for the few who side with Bose, Congress newspapers support the Mahatma, recognizing that the communal situation and the internal weaknesses of the Congress organization make it unlikely that "direct action" would have results satisfactory to the Congress.

If words are to be trusted, Bose and his friends have no such qualms. The Bengal Provincial Congress committee, backbone of the Bose organization, has been disaffiliated by the main Congress body for indifference to the Forward Bloc was not represented at the Congress session. As a result the debate lacked fire. The official resolutions encountered little opposition—what opposition there came from M. N. Roy, the Communist, and a handful of supporters. Bose saw to it that he was not out of the picture. He staged an "Anti-Compromise" conference near the Congress camp and arranged cleverly to attract visitors attending the official session. His main theme was that Gandhi and the Congress leaders were unwilling to commit themselves at the head of the country and instead were seeking a compromise with the British government.

Comment on Congress Bitter words were said about the Congress leaders and they reciprocated in kind. The Congress Rightist press attacks Bose ferociously. The Patna "Searchlight" for instance, remarks that he has no program and merely indulged in make-believe. It recalls that Bose was going to start a struggle in Bengal several months ago but never did.

The Allahabad "Leader" says the Forward Bloc's policy of fomenting civil strife will lead only to violence and hypocrisy and should be opposed to every well-wisher of India. It adds Bose's principal object is merely to wrest power from the Congress high command and occupy Gandhi's position.

The conference was less spectacular than usual because of unexpected rainfall and the difficulty of reaching the site. Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, Congress president and a Moslem divine, hardly possessed the political stature of his immediate predecessors. Azad's speech on the desirability

### Canadian Wartime Fliers

#### GROUP CAPTAIN HAROLD EDWARDS AIR MEMBER FOR PERSONNEL CANADIAN A.R. COUNCIL

(By The Canadian Press) Few men place greater stress on discipline than Group Captain Harold Edwards of the Royal Canadian Air Force, because he knew the importance of discipline. He was able to make two escapes from German prison guards in the First Great War. That the escapes failed in the end was not his fault. But without discipline they never could have progressed as far as they did, according to the Air Member for Personnel of the Air Council.

Edwards—"Gus" to those who know him well—received his present appointment last Feb. 3 and laid down then his theory that the discipline is the foundation of success in military, otherwise and especially necessary in air force activities. He is in charge of all recruiting for the R. C. A. F. and the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan but those men who come under him need never worry too greatly about the discipline he calls for.

It is the kind members of any organization with a job to do, seek for themselves, whether they belong to a scrub hockey squad or something as grand as the R. C. A. F. Edwards, whose blue eyes twinkle as he talks, speaks in the manner of a man who has seen a lot of things and people and puts a good deal of faith in his fellow man.

"Discipline and efficiency go hand in hand," he told newspapermen. "The air force can successfully carry out its mission only when the entire personnel is trained to carry out orders smartly and with full co-ordination."

Edwards flew in the First Great War with the Royal Naval Air Service and on April 14, 1917, he was shot down behind the enemy lines, captured and sent to a German prison camp at Kolmar where he and two other British prisoners were placed behind bars together.

Soap and Hackaw A cake of soap, at a premium the night he was captured, was traded to a guard for a hacksaw blade while friends smuggled the prisoners a tiny compass and maps. Edwards placed his fellow prisoners in a cell with the German guards on their 20-up and 20-down guard duty and sawed through the bars of a window himself.

Once the bars were cut discipline counted because one prisoner at a time could leave through the window. And after each man left the bars had to be replaced so the sentry, on his next trip past, would notice nothing out of the ordinary. One free of their prisons the fugitives spent 10 nights trying to reach neutral soil. By day they slept in haystacks. After 10 days hiking and cold, wet and hungry following a three-day rain, they relaxed their caution and were captured by military authorities.

Returned to Kolmar each prisoner spent two weeks in solitary confinement and a second attempt to escape ended when, after digging a hole in their cell wall they were discovered in the cellar of the University that was being used as a detention base.

Edwards, a native of Lancashire, England, came to Canada as a boy and grew up in Nova Scotia. He joined the Royal Naval in 1915 and later was transferred to the Royal Naval Air Service where he served as a fighting pilot in France until the German secret bullet sent him down behind the enemy lines.

### In "Roaring" Days of British House

LONDON, May 8—(CP)—The rip-roaring days when Members of Parliament dressed to kill and could and would drink themselves under the table in a room only a few yards from the House of Commons were recalled when Walter Erskine, Deputy Serjeant-at-Arms, retired after 40 years service. Job of the Serjeant-at-Arms, and assistants, is to keep the place in order—officially to attend the Speaker, to carry out directions for the maintenance of order, to arrest strangers when necessary, to execute warrants for contempt, and to bring persons in custody before the Bar of the House.

The interesting revelation made on Erskine's retirement concerned an unused office of a former Serjeant-at-Arms, named in a clubby manner "Gosset's Room." It was situated at one end of the Parliament buildings.

Here, it is said, certain M. P.s used to spend a good deal of their spare time discussing Parliament and this and that. A barrel of whisky was always on tap. Once the name for the "Gosset's Room" workman fell inside as he began to strip the paper from the wall. He was overcome by the fumes of the whisky which, in the course of years, had impregnated the wallpaper.

All that was around 1885 when the Erskine family had moved to Speaker's Court, at the other end of the building, following the appointment of Erskine Sealer as Serjeant-at-Arms.

Walter Erskine's retirement from the Palace of Westminster—his name for the "Gosset's Room" broke a link in a chain of service begun in 1835. Then Sir William Gosset was appointed Serjeant-at-Arms and for 105 consecutive years, Gosset and Erskines served as Serjeants or assistants. Greatest change in his time at Westminster, said Erskine, is in the way M. P.s dress. Members nowadays seem to think that any clothes are good enough for the House," he said.

### Preparation of The Brooder Pen

(Experimental Farms News)

The cleanliness of the brooder pen, the feeding equipment, and the drinking fountains cannot be emphasized too strongly, because sanitation is one of the major factors in the economic production of chickens, states M. H. Jenkins, Head Poultryman, Dominion Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., in preparing the brooder pen for young chicks at the Farm, methods are used similar to those followed in the preparation of the pens for young stock from range, namely: (1) The ceiling, walls, and floor are thoroughly brushed down and the dirt removed. (2) The pen is holed to soften any dirt that may have hardened into the walls and thus permits more thorough cleaning. (3) The walls and floor are scrubbed with a lye solution (13 oz. can to 5 gallons of water). This is followed with a disinfectant solution (used according to the directions on the manufacturer). (4) The pen is again holed to remove cleaning solutions and then allowed to air and dry. The brooder stove is started so that the pen will be thoroughly dry. (5) All the feeding equipment, etc., is gone over in the same manner. (6) When the pen and equipment are thoroughly dried, fresh litter of either shavings or cut straw is put in. (7) The final step is to start the brooder stoves and regulate them for a few days before the chicks arrive.
