**NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN DISCUSSED.**

**WINNIPEG**—That health certificates should be required before the granting of marriage licenses as a measure for the protection of the race against venereal diseases was one of the recommendations handed to the resolutions committee at the afternoon session of the National Council of women yesterday.

Three sessions were held during the day with Mrs. F. S. Torrington of Toronto, in the chair at the morning and evening sessions and the Marchioness of Aberdeen presiding during the afternoon.

In a discussion of tuberculosis it was recommended that the Council press for Dominion legislation dealing with the matter.

Miss E. L. Johns, Winnipeg, dealt with professions and vocational training of women and advocated the establishment of Government bureaus of labor, operating provincially with a Dominion bureau to act as a clearing house for the provinces. She also urged that the Government should provide vocational training for boys and girls such training to include household service and the care of children.

The convener on agriculture, Mrs. L. A. Hamilton, of Toronto, recommended that the Government include women in any land scheme which may be proposed and that homesteads be opened to women.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over 21 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not at a Sub-Agency on certain conditions.  
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.  
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.  
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$300.  
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

**U. S. ADMIRAL PAYS TRIBUTE TO BRITISH NAVY**

LONDON—Vice-Admiral William S. Sims, U. S. N., received a most enthusiastic greeting when he arose to speak today at the great religious thanksgiving service held in the opera house in Kingsway to commemorate the Battle of Jutland.

Referring to what he characterized as his, perhaps, undiplomatic speech in the Long Guildhall on the occasion of the visit of the American fleet in 1910, when he said that every ship, every dollar and every drop of blood of America could be counted on by England if she was ever menaced by a combination of nations, Admiral Sims continued: "Today that prophecy is being realized, and I trust that if another battle of Jutland occurs, the American navy will prove itself equal to the glorious traditions of the British navy."

Admiral Sims said he was glad of the opportunity, on behalf of the American navy, to express profound admiration for the British heroes who had so gloriously given their lives in the Jutland battle, and to voice the sympathy of the American navy and the American people, who realize that the blood shed on that day was shed for the cause of freedom throughout the world.

What those men died for, continued the admiral, was perhaps not at first understood in America, but it is now, and there was the pronouncement of President Wilson to show that the United States was prepared to go to any lengths in the fight for liberty and freedom.

**RUSSIAN SAILORS NOW INDEPENDENT**

PETROGRAD.—Sailors from the Kronstadt garrison, who recently declared its independence of the central government, arrived in Petrograd early this morning with the announcement that warships at Kronstadt would come to Petrograd immediately and land men to make demonstrations. Later it was reported that sailors had landed at Gutuyev Island, port of Petrograd, and begun an attack. A visit to the Gutuyev port quarter showed that the story of the landing and attack was untrue. However, it was sufficiently alarming to provoke intense excitement in the city and cause the despatch to the spot of a military force.

**SIX SONS ARE SERVING THEIR KING**

Mrs. Michael Brennan, Long River has received the following letter from Mrs. Alice Payne, a visitor to the Hospital in England in which her son is wounded:

5 Highbury Terrace,  
Monkbridge Road,  
Headingley,  
Leeds, England.  
May 8th, 1917

Dear Mrs. Brennan—

You will be surprised at receiving a letter from me, as I am a stranger to you so I must tell you I am sitting on my son Alec in Beckett's Park Hospital, in fact I call him my adopted boy or the time being, so he thought you would like me to write and tell you, now I find him occasionally. Well, I am glad to tell you, he is getting on very nicely just now and is always very cheerful. It is a very nice hospital he is at, in fact the largest and best in Yorkshire. All the dear boys like being here, I have been a visitor here for two years so have had a lot of adopted sons, as I call them, some from Australia, Canada and different parts of England, but I always try to get a patient whose friends are too far off to visit them, so that I can take the place of a mother, as I hope some day I will do likewise to my own dear boys, who are so far away from me. I do not know if Alec has told you he has five sons, serving in the war and another who was killed in France last September, so you see it makes me very keen on doing what I can for my dear boys who are brought here. There are two visiting days Tuesday and Saturday and either I or my daughters will look after your boy and let you know how he progresses. I might tell you that three of my sons joined up in Canada and of course were brought to England with their Battalions, one is in the 75, 116 and 3rd Canadian Pioneers all in France also Ted and Frank are in Bermuda, so you see I am a real soldier's mother.

I am sure you shall all be very thankful when this dreadful war is over and our boys come back to us. The one who was killed was my youngest of seven sons, the eldest is still at home keeping on his father's business for me, but at the same time is doing his bit as a Special Constable, should be very pleased to hear from you at any time. Trusting you and the rest of your family are in good health.
