## Murdock Censured By Labor Council

### Toronto District Body Protests to Premier for "Indiscretions"

TORONTO, Jan. 21.—The district Labor Council at its meeting tonight, after hearing an address by John Flett, A. F. of L. organizer, relative to the labor conditions at Welland, where efforts have been made to reduce wages, passed a motion censuring Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, for having expressed approval of such reductions. It was decided to forward a letter of protest to Premier King so that "he might take action to prevent further indiscretions by the Labor Minister."

Protests were also voiced against the indictment of corporal punishment on persons convicted of any class of crime, as, in the opinion of the delegates, the use of the lash was inhuman and degrading. In particular, the action of Judge Coatsworth in ordering the lash for "Red" Ryan, in addition to a sentence of life imprisonment was condemned.

Representatives of the stranded harvesters were on hand to air their grievances and to ask for accommodation at the Labor Temple to organize the unemployed.

### CROWN JEWELS TO BE PAWNEED

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The crown jewels of Saxony, one of the richest and most famous of royal treasures in Europe, will be used to rehabilitate the finances of the once proud monarchy, which today is the poorest and most unhappy of the industrial States, which go to make up the German Reich. The present Government has virtually decided to pawn the former royal treasury, which at a conservative estimate was worth more than \$200,000,000. Some experts have estimated the collection of jewels at three times that sum; but, as all the contents of the "green vault," which was established by Augustus the Strong, King of Saxony and of Poland in the 17th century, have never been classified piece by piece or valued in detail, no one really knows what their worth is. The vault contains, in addition to the crown jewels, hundreds of the rarest objects that have ever been exhibited to visitors, but in the green vault itself are numbers of large gold cups and bowls heaped high with precious stones, cut and uncut, which have never been even weighed.

Among other treasures not displayed to the public are 200 large studs set with diamonds of 12 1/2 carats each, and mounted so that two of them form a clasp and appear as a single jewel. There are many ropes of pearls, one of which contains 228 pearls of the purest Orient. Then there are no less than 15 jewelled collars of the Order of the Golden Fleece and the foreign orders of a long line of precious stones. Negotiations with the former reigning house have been completed, and the greater part of royal treasure has not been acknowledged to be the property of the Free State of Saxony, which has already approached some of the largest foreign banks for loans with which to rehabilitate the State finances.

### Rancher Silent Witness as Deer Engage in Battle

ALTURAS, Cal., Jan. 21.—J. Gutzman, a rancher, recently was eye-witness to a spectacle not often seen by human beings, that of a deadly combat between two male deer with their horns interlocked. Gutzman, who is deaf, came on the deer in a wilderness near here and was within 25 feet of them before he saw them or they sensed his presence. When the bucks noted the intrusion, they ceased fighting and scrambled away, their horns still locked, to a point hardly 100 yards distant, where the battle was resumed. Gutzman did not again approach the animals. Instead he notified the game warden, and the next day an investigation was made. The bucks could not be found, but the trail they had left for miles told eloquently of the terrific battle. In places the ground was torn up as if by a plow and saplings were broken down. At one point the fettered hoofs had fallen over a cliff 12 feet high.

The game warden predicted that the final chapter of the episode would be written when some hunter found two pairs of whitened horns linked together. Such finds are not uncommon, an indication that fights between male deer often last until both die of exhaustion or starvation.

### Tokio Lost 1,000,000 People

TOKIO, Jan. 21.—Tokio has dropped from fifth to tenth place among the cities of the world in population as a result of the deaths and evacuations following the earthquake and fire. By the census taken two years ago there were 2,499,000 people in the capital. A census taken November 15 showed but 1,529,616.

The chief of the statistical department of the municipality believes that Tokio will regain her position in about six years.
