LONDON, May 12.—Prior to the granting to Great Britain of the mandate for Palestine, Louis D. Brandeis, associate Justice of the Scotus, and the Right Hon. Herbert L. Samuel, former secretary of State for Home Affairs, were most favored to the post of High Commissioner, according to information received by the Associated Press. But Great Britain having been made the Mandatory Power, virtually eliminates consideration of Judge Brandeis and an official announcement of the appointment of Mr. Samuel is regarded as assured within a few days.
