ated and student veterans and said press reports indicated that 31 per cent of the veterans attending university had to abandon their courses because of financial difficulties.

Veterans Minister Gregg entered the debate briefly to say that of the 32,000 veterans attending university only 69, or one fifth of one per cent had left because of financial difficulties.

Mr. Harkness urged the Government to encourage the movement of capital into oil exploration by granting concessions in taxes, duties and other charges sought by the oil industry. This would help to make Canada independent of the United States as a source of oil supplies.

Mr. Menary suggested that the area of land which a veteran may purchase under the Veterans' Land Act be reduced from 3 1/2 acres to one-half acre and said many veterans wanted to build on the land but found the required area too large to handle.

Mr. Juras criticized what he termed "propaganda" against the Canadian-United Kingdom wheat agreement put out by the Seale Grain Company of Winnipeg.

He said he had no personal animosity against any grain company, but he felt he should draw attention to the policies in the "propaganda."

J.A. Ross (P.C.—Souris) asked Mr. Juras if he disputed the monthly figures put out by the Seale Company.

Mr. Juras said he did.

On June 5, 1946, the company letter said U.S. farmers were getting \$2.18 a bushel for their wheat that day while Canadian farmers were getting only \$1.55. A check of Chicago grain quotes for that day showed wheat was no where near \$2.18. Another inaccuracy was that few of any farmers received the price quoted on the market.

Discusses Oil Situation

Mr. Harkness drew attention to Canada's dependent oil supply and said it was apparent that the country no longer could depend on the United States as a source of the liquid fuel.

He repeated requests which he previously had made for special tax reductions for the industry.

He said the rise in crude oil prices had done much to encourage drilling for new oil supplies.

He suggested that special tax concessions granted to the gold mining industry last year be extended in part at least, to the oil industry.

Suggesting development of Alberta's tar sands, he said they were a national problem and should be considered on that basis.

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but in January, 1881, he returned permanently to Charlottetown, where in May of that year he went to work with the dry goods firm of Perkins and Sterns as a parcel boy.

Mr. MacLeod remained with this firm for twelve years, acquiring a thorough knowledge of the business. On January 1, 1893, he and another clerk, Mr. George M. Moore, bought out the firm in which they were employed and founded their own establishment of Moore and MacLeod on the same premises. In the following year Messrs. W. A. Stewart and J. P. Gordon were admitted as partners. As noted above, Mr. MacLeod's death has been the first break in this business relationship which continued uninterrupted for fifty-four years. During that time the business has continued to expand and the firm occupies a leading place among the dry goods establishments of the Maritimes.

Long associated with the Charlottetown Board of Trade, Mr. MacLeod was one of its ablest and most active members. He was a past president of the organization, and was instrumental in obtaining many improvements in transportation and other services for the City and Province.

He was a successful delegate to Ottawa on many occasions, notably when he accompanied the late Messrs. Nelson Battenbury and S. A. Macdonald, Judge Arsenault, Senator Sinclair and the late R. H. Jenkins, M.P., for the purpose of obtaining a C.N.R. hotel for Charlottetown, and later in pressing for settlement for two steamers of the Northumberland Ferries, Ltd., which had been requisitioned by the Dominion Government during the war.

Up to the time of his death Mr. MacLeod was a member of the board of directors of the Y.M.C.A. and chairman of its building committee. Always keenly interested in this institution, he used to take pleasure in recalling how, as a youth in frail health, he built up a vigorous constitution by regular attendance at the "Y" gymnasium, which was the first of its kind on the Island. In later years he devoted himself wholeheartedly to "Y" campaigns for recreational and other facilities.

Hospital, Etc.

In the same spirit Mr. MacLeod served the interests of the Prince Edward Island Hospital, being for eighteen years a member of the board of trustees, and board chairman during the three years' period which saw the present magnificent hospital building constructed.

He took an active part in establishing the Tourist Association here, serving as chairman of its finance committee for several years. He was also a director of the old Charlottetown Hotel Company, and later of the North Shore Hotel Company and of Northumberland Ferries, Ltd.

The Protestant Orphanage was another institution which benefited by Mr. MacLeod's experience, he and the late Mr. W. K. Rogers being responsible for organizing the drive which resulted in paying off a debt of some \$90,000 on that institution.

A lifelong Liberal in politics, Mr. MacLeod never sought political honors for himself, but by a tower of strength to the party and its leaders. He was for some years president of the Queen's County Liberal Association, and his wise counsel and organizing ability had much to do with Liberal successes in the County over a period of years.

Unassuming in manner, pleasant and courteous at all times, he made friends among all classes and had the complete confidence of everyone who was privileged to know him intimately. Advancing years seemed to have little effect on his constitution, and force on his constitution, and force whatever on his enterprising spirit.

Five Killed In Tornado (By The Associated Press) NEWTON, Miss., Feb. 13—Five persons were killed, more than a score injured and at least five homes destroyed when a tornado ripped around Newton this afternoon. The known dead are M. P. Phillips, 61; Mrs. Phillips, 50; Mrs. Virginia Page, 61; Rodell Page, 35. One unidentified person also was killed. Highway workers were searching debris for possible additional dead.

Carrots Reported \$3.50 Bushel In Toronto TORONTO, Feb. 13 — Produce dealers said yesterday that carrots, normally quoted at about \$1.50 a bushel wholesale, are selling here at \$3.50 a bushel. Current retail prices range from three pounds for 25 cents to 10 cents a pound. Parsnips sold at about 12 1/2 cents a pound retail, as against about 7 1/2 cents a pound normally charged at this time of year.
