much favor.

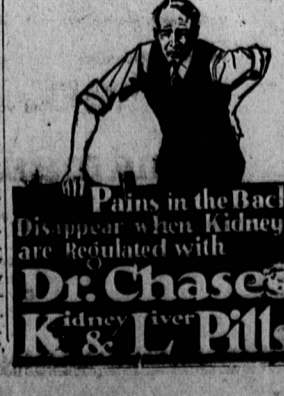
REGRETTABLE ILLNESS.—

WAR HATREDS STILL ALIVE
LONDON, Sept. 26.—It is too
soon to expect the end of racial
antipathies engendered by the war.
In the opinion of the rector of a
small town in Norfolk, he recently
learned a lesson that was pointed
and conclusive.
Wanting to embellish a war
memorial in the town with some
carved figures, the rector took it
upon himself to order the work done
in due time the figures arrived
and were installed. Then the trouble
began, for it was learned that
the figures had been carved in
Germany. A storm of indignation
broke upon the head of the rector.
He appealed to his church
superiors for support which was not
forthcoming and then retired to
his impossible position.

GERMANY SEVERE ON TRAITORS.
LEIPSIG, Sept. 26.—Germany's
highest court shows little mercy
for men arraigned before it for
treason in the great war.
General Streib was recently given
a life sentence for having betrayed
his command in March, 1916.
The evidence showed that he
deserted the German army and went
over to the French. A short time
later concentrated French artillery
against the entrenchments where
Streib had been serving showed
that he had revealed all
details of the positions to the
enemy.
Streib returned to Germany in
1920, and was arrested at his home
in Magdeburg and charged with
high treason, which he admitted.
His defence was that he was badly
treated by superiors, and could
not endure further military service.



FIVE DROWN WHILE BOATING

(By Dominion News Service)

DUBLIN, Sept. 26.—Five people,
including three girls, were
drowned while boating on the River
Shannon at Tarmoherry, five miles
from Longford. The victims are:—
Harry Dillon, employed by the
Longford Drug Co.
John Amberson, a native of Co.
Tyrone, chemist's assistant.
Miss Harriet Molloy, daughter of
a Longford merchant.
Miss Delia Moran, a native of
Tarmoherry, and Miss Moran, her
sister.
The two young men went to Tarmoherry
yesterday from Longford,
and there met four ladies. The
party procured a boat and rowed
from Tarmoherry bridge towards
a weir, between three and four
hundred yards down the river.
Apparently they got too close to
the weir, and on turning around
were unable to over come the
current, which at this point is particularly
swift. The boat was swept
through the sluice and was upset,
all the occupants being thrown into
the water.
The fourth lady in the party, and
the only survivor, is Miss Anne
McKenna, daughter of Mr. Charles
McKenna, Urban District Councillor.
She was swept towards the bank,
and was rescued by a man named
Neal, who was near the spot. She
was unconscious when brought
ashore, but soon revived.
The dead affair occurred at about
five o'clock in full view of a large
number of people. They were powerless,
however to render effective
aid once the boat was driven
through the sluice by the current.
Shortly after the tragedy Civic
Guardians dragged the river, but
the bodies have not been recovered.

of Agriculture, commended the
speech of Hon. Mr. Motherwell,
and expressed pleasure at his visit
here. For a long time he has realized
the importance of agricultural

which better animals and better
produce may be raised. He referred
to the larger herds and other
advantages New Zealand possesses
in dairying, of which also Mr. Motherwell

in live stock exhibits gave
him particular pleasure.

therefore, to help along the
work as much as possible.
Mr. Lea referred to recent improvements
in hog grading and
