Rattenbury, had not yet received any particulars. The following from the Halifax Herald will however, give the desired information. The steamer Amethyst, running between Montreal and St. John's, Nfld., calling at Charlottetown, Cheticamp and Sydney, went ashore on Mutton Head near Trepassey, Nfld., on Saturday afternoon. She was on her way from Montreal and was loaded with cattle. A dispatch stated that she would be a total loss. Charles Brister and Son received a message to that effect and also another that she might be saved. The Messrs. Brister have a wrecking steamer in Newfoundland and this was directed to proceed to the wreck, but nothing has been done from Halifax. The Amethyst was formerly the Santiago de Cuba, 1357 tons register and was built at Stockton in 1878. She was owned by G. H. Dow and others, and Captain Fulton, who was in command, was part owner. She was at one time owned by G. C. Cook, Halifax.
