HOW BRITAIN BUILDS WARSHIPS.

The great battleship Dreadnought is designed to embody the result of the observation of British officers who were present with Togo in the sea-fights between Japan and Russia. The Dreadnought is intended to be swifter, 2,000 tons heavier, and to carry six more heavy guns than any warship yet built. It is the first battleship to be built since the war, and for several reasons the construction has been hastened.

The keel was laid October 10, the intention being to have the ship launched in six months, but on February 10, or in exactly four months, the mighty ship was launched, two months within the stipulated time. There is therefore good reason to expect that the Dreadnought may be completed and placed in commission within 18 months of the time the keel was laid. The great speed of construction is due, we are told, to the desire of the Admiralty to subject the ship to a series of very thorough tests before ordering other ships of her class.

It is the subject of remark that no other naval power could build a warship of the size, speed and equipment of the Dreadnought in less than three years. The Scientific American says "the significance of this rapid construction is seen in the potentiality of replacement it suggests, if Britain were engaged in a lengthy war. There are a dozen British yards (including those of the Government) that could build one or two ships of this class in about the same time; and this would mean the creation of a new battleship fleet of the Japanese war."

On Saturday His Worship Mayor Paton gave instruction to have the city snow plow sent in advance over the route to be followed by the St. Patrick's Day procession. This much improved the footing for the large number of processionists. His Worship's kindness was much appreciated by them and by all citizens who value thoughtful and disinterested public service.

The recent death of Susan B. Anthony has removed from life's activity one whose name was much before the public twenty-five to fifty years ago as an advocate of women's rights. In youth Miss Anthony taught school, first at one dollar a week, and was later able to get a dollar and a half to two dollars with board. Masculine teachers were paid three or four times as much. Much has grown out of the women's rights movement to equalize the rights and opportunities of women and men, but the ultimate object on which she set her heart, equal voting privileges, has not yet been gained.

The Insurance Commission have not gone very far yet with their inquiry, having begun at Jerusalem, so to speak, by investigating the Government Insurance Department at Ottawa. The result has been to turn the tide of criticism, for the time at least, from the companies to this Department. In the light of the testimony given by the Superintendent and the Actuary, the Department of Insurance appears to have been about as useful as the proverbial fifth wheel to a coach. The examination proved a bad breakdown for the Department and proved in the first hour the need of an inquiry such as has been entered upon.

There are many advantages to be obtained by the consolidation of schools, and the greatest credit is due Sir William Macdonald for his generous provisions in that regard. Of course things run smoothly while a millionaire philanthropist pays the bills, but we must think of what is likely to happen when this support is withdrawn. Our people have been so long accustomed to have the Government carry almost the entire cost of education, that it remains to be seen whether they will heartily undertake the considerable expense which must fall upon the consolidated districts when outside support is withdrawn.

Of course we must hope for the best. Looking to the future and the extension of the consolidation system our own idea would be to proceed upon a less costly plan, bringing two or three schools together instead of the larger number, and so reducing the distance and the cost of conveying the pupils to school. In the meantime a campaign of education among the ratepayers will be necessary to convince them of the value of the improved schools and to enlarge their generosity in the matter of contributing to their support. This will be a somewhat arduous task but it ought not to prove an impossible one.
