

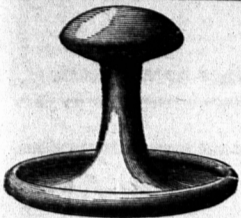

## SUPREME COURT.

THURSDAY, FORENOON

At the Supreme Court at Georgetown yesterday the prisoner John A. McDonald who was convicted Wednesday evening for assault with a knife was brought up for sentence. Mr. Hazard, K. C. in the absence of the Attorney General moved for the judgment of the court. Mr. Justice Hodgson sentenced the prisoner to 14 days in King's County Jail. In doing so the learned judge spoke strongly on the conduct of the prisoner's son in provoking the prisoner to be in jail for four months which coupled with a strong recommendation to mercy from the jury was considered by the judge in passing sentence.

Monteith vs McInnis. This is an action for wages. The plaintiff claims six years' wages as the housekeeper for defendant. The plaintiff is the widow of Edward Monteith, late of Charlottetown and the defendant is a former resident of Southport. James A. McDonald for plaintiff, Johnson and Ryan for defendant.

AFTERNOON  
In the case of Mary Monteith vs. John R. McInnis. Mr. Johnston yesterday afternoon closed the case for the defendant and addressed the jury. Ebenezer McDonald replied for the plaintiff. Mr. Justice Hodgson charged the jury at some length after which they retired but in a short time returned and asked the judge whether the jury had power to give a non suit. His Lordship replied that inasmuch as there was evidence on both sides it must be considered and a verdict one way or the other returned. The jury again retired and subsequently brought in a verdict for the defendant.

Executors of Chas. Palmer vs. Ryan. Action on promissory note alleged to be made over thirty years ago, now before the Court. Hazard, K. C. and Stewart, K. C. for plaintiff; Morson, K. C. and Johnston for the defendant. Court adjourned at 5 o'clock and meets again at 10.30 a. m. today.
