TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

At the morning service in Trinity Church yesterday the minister spoke of the text—Second Corinthians Chapter 4:18 "While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal." The minister recalled that Paul was one of a group of people in Asia Minor who were living in pagan surroundings and were passing through difficult disappointments and dangerous experiences but the apostle reassured them by asserting his confidence and faith in Jesus as Lord and expressing the certainty that out of their present tribulation and distress there would emerge a new consciousness of the spiritual forces as revealed in Christ and through which they would receive strength to conquer and overcome the evils of their day. And looking back over 1945 we recognize the trials that have been so manifest in their expression through material forces but we, as Christians, look beneath that manifestation of power in material things and recognize that underneath and behind it all there is the unseen which is eternal and indestructible. The minister suggested that even amid the difficulties of 1945 there are evidences and the consciousness within the human spirit of the value and strength of the unseen.

SELECTING THE MATING PEN

With the success of the poultry industry in Canada depending upon the quality of the poultry population it naturally follows that the selection of the mating pen is all-important. Too often, this phase of the work is neglected with the result that improvement in flock quality is slow and disappointing. A high producing sire is not likely to produce a family of low producing sisters is not likely to go far in flock improvement, but a group of high producing sisters with all probability produce daughters that will prove their worth from an egg-laying standpoint.

As the male is half of the breeding flock special care should be taken in his selection. He should be free from defects and abnormalities such as sprigs, stubs and split wings. The head is the best single criterion of quality and vigour as denoted by a bright eye and alert appearance and should be decidedly masculine in all aspects.

Care exercised in the selection of the breeding stock pays dividends in the resultant progeny and may well mean the difference between success and failure to the poultry farmer.

All birds selected for breeding should have the general characteristics of health, alertness, vigour, slow over-fat, sluggish birds should be discarded, so too should thin birds with pale combs, those showing any evidence of white or pearly eye, a clean-cut comb and bright, prominent eye are a good indication of health and vigour and such birds should have preference.

It is best type they should be bred with full rounded wings, flat or slab-sided birds, also heavy
