Two R.A.F. Men To Battle For Heavies Crown

LONDON, April 23—(CP)—A couple of Royal Air Force sergeants will attempt to bash the daylight out of one another in one of these fine nights and the winner can dust off the British heavyweight boxing crown and place it on his head. That's because Giant Jack London threw one of the hardest smashes of his long career and punched himself right into a championship bout with Freddie Mills, the Bouremouth strong man who put the clincher on the former heavyweight king's thoughts of retirement. Both are R.A.F. men. London, who for nigh on 10 years has been trying to climb into a ring with the championship at stake, proved himself the gent for the job by knocking out Young Al Robinson of Leeds in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-round eliminator at Leicester. Mills, who took the British and Empire light-heavyweight titles by sending the defending champion, P.O. Len Harvey hurtling over the ropes last June, watched the battle between Britain's two biggest ring-

men, from a ringside seat. Mills was named the outstanding contender for the heavy title when Harvey, a few months after his defeat by Mills, announced his retirement as heavyweight king, a title he also held.

Conceded Contender

A veteran clouter from West Hartlepool, London never showed himself faster and more aggressive than against Robinson. He was so impressive that critics, who hitherto gave him scant chance of winning a title, conceded that on his new-found form Mills would have a tremendous task to beat him. Considered one of the best heavyweight battlers in this country in years, the London-Robinson slugfest ended sensationally. Robinson had been pecking away with a left when London stepped in with a right that started from his hip. The punch caught his blonde adversary under the jaw, lifted him off his feet and dropped him flat on his back. He was counted out after making an effort to rise, and was carried to his corner.

Two rounds earlier Robinson had brought the crowd yelling to its feet when after receiving a heavy body-battering, he knocked London to the canvas with a left swing. London jumped up immediately, blood spurted from his eye and he obviously was shaken. But he came back strongly and belted Robinson with body swings.

Matter of Weights

London fought at 215 1-2 pounds, about 10 pounds under his usual ring weight and gained speed by the shedding of flesh. Robinson, no puny lad either, tipped the scales at 214. In contrast, Mills, also an R.A.F. sergeant and a former boxer who came under the expert guidance of Ted Broadbent, Britain's maker of champions, fights at 180. London's 35-pound pull in the weights will be a big advantage when he and Mills meet but Freddie is ready. He's tired of ring in-

activity since he won the light-heavy title; his motto is "the bigger they come, the harder they fall," and he holds previous victories over both London and Robinson.

Sharp Gains In Cattle Marketings

OTTAWA, April 23—(CP)—Sharp gains in cattle marketing and slaughtering were reported today by the Agriculture Department. Sales at public stockyards and shipments to packing plants in the week ended April 22 totalled 21,383 head against 18,394 in the same period last year. Inspected slaughtering in the week ended April 17 were 20,971 head against 13,586 last year. The report showed a further gain in the export of dairy cattle to the United States, with shipments for 1943 to April 22 placed at 9,922 head against 5,380 in 1942.

Soldier Dies In Ottawa Fire

OTTAWA, April 23—(CP)—A two-alarm fire gutted the Royal building in downtown Ottawa early today and took the life of Col. F. B. Inkster 59. Origin of the spectacular blaze was unknown. Damage was estimated at more than \$100,000. Col. Inkster was last seen silhouetted against a background of roaring flames as he stood at a fourth floor window. "Goodbye boys, I'm finished," he said. Then he disappeared. More than four hours later, while part of the building still was ablaze, firemen using an aerial
