THE GASPAREUX WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

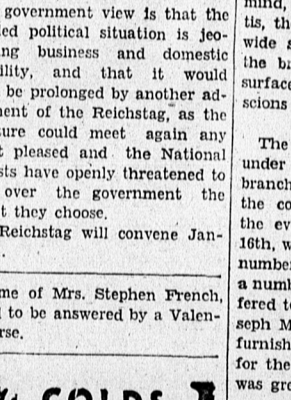

Reichstag Will Convene Jan 31

BERLIN, Jan. 24.- (A.P.)-Goaded by a Nationalist attack, Chancellor Kurt Von Schleicher, whose lone game has been mystifying observers, revealed his hand tonight, showing that he intends to force political issues with the greatest celerity. This was disclosed by a government-inspired statement by the semi-official Wolff News Agency, according to which the government will not tolerate further adjournment of the Reichstag, even for a longer period of time than past adjournments. The government view is that the unsettled political situation is jeopardizing business and domestic tranquility, and that it would merely be prolonged by another adjournment of the Reichstag, as the legislature could meet again any time it pleased and the National Socialists have openly threatened to topple over the government the moment they choose. The Reichstag will convene January 31.
