100 YEARS OLD

The following, which is of much interest, is taken from the Truro News of recent date. Mrs. L. J. Coddin, city, is a relative of Mrs. Barnhill. At her home, Willow street, Truro, was recently celebrated the one hundredth birthday of a very remarkable old lady, Mrs. John Barnhill. Mrs. Barnhill is still in vigorous health, and with her mental powers unimpaired. Few of the present generation, outside of her immediate friends, realize what a link with the past this old lady is. She is unique, and has a history which few can boast of. Her grandfather, John Johnson, was born in the North of Ireland in the year 1711, and came with his wife and family, and settled in Lower Village of Truro. He died in 1793, aged 82 years, and his wife in 1796, aged 84. John, their eldest son, was born in Ireland in 1741. He inherited his father's property, and being a man of robust health, outlived all the other grantees and first settlers, dying in 1841, just one day short of his hundredth birthday. His wife, Margaret Davison, survived him until 1869, dying at the age of 94. They had three sons and four daughters, the youngest being Sophia, born August 1, 1811, and who married John Barnhill, May 4, 1835, and who has lived to celebrate her 100th birthday. Mrs. Barnhill's father did not survive until the age of 54, being the youngest child, and was not born until the father was 70 years of age. There must be very few cases extant where a woman, living at 100, was born of a father 70 years of age. In Mrs. Barnhill's family there are now living five generations in direct descent. NOEL BRUNTON, DIRECTOR MT. ALLISON CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC SACKVILLE, N. B., Aug. 14—The position of director of Mount Allison Conservatory of Music, left vacant by the resignation of Prof. Harry Horsfall, has been filled by the appointment of Prof. J. Noel Brunton, late professor of piano at the Metropolitan Academy of Music, Forest Gate, London, England. Prof. Brunton studied piano and the theory of music at the Stein Conservatorium, Berlin, Germany, from which institution he took his diploma as performer and teacher. He was subsequently a pupil for fourteen months of the great Leopold Godowsky of the same city. He teaches according to the modern school of players, working on the Leschetitzky method. He is skilled in being an exceptionally good pianist and has had a great deal of successful experience both in teaching and in concert work. Before studying in Berlin Prof. Brunton held the position of Master of Music at the Bangor Grammar School, Ireland. While on the staff of the Metropolitan Academy he passed pupils through the higher examinations of the Royal Academy and Trinity College and 95 per cent. gained honors, a record exceedingly hard to beat. By Paul Lutzko, of the Stein Conservatorium, says: "During the time he has been here Prof. Brunton has proved himself to be a most diligent and earnest student. His work was always exceptionally well prepared, consequently he has now succeeded in bringing his technique to a high standard of perfection as well as obtaining a thorough knowledge of classical and modern literature. At the annual examinations Prof. Brunton gained high distinction both in harmony and pianoforte."
