I hope it may soon be abolished."

CIVIC ELECTIONS IN SUMMERSIDE

There was a Large Vote Polled—Only Two Members of the old Council were Returned—Mayor McNeill Elected by Acclamation.

"A weapon that comes down as still As snowflakes fall upon the sod; But executes a freeman's will; As lightning does the will of God; And from its force, nor doors nor locks Can shield you,—'tis the ballot box."

The civic elections in Summerside resulted yesterday in the return of but two members of the old Board or three including Ryan who stood in place of Dickieson. The honors went to Ryan who while nominated on the old Board ticket was taken up largely by the voters for the new Board on which he was selected as the sixth man. In this way Mr. Ryan naturally stood a favorable chance of securing both parties' vote.

There was a large vote polled there being 500 ballots of which only five were spoiled, so that even the lowest man represents more than half the electorate who cast ballots.

The contest was orderly and on the whole quiet, yet in some cases quite keen. Interest reached the maximum when the ballots were being counted. Market Hall being well filled with anxious citizens waiting the results.

It will be seen that neither side can claim much victory, there being three of each ticket elected if Ryan may be counted with the party which nominated him, though the largest plurality of votes went in favor of the new members.
