Mr. Semple went to remove the belt and in doing so stepped on the inside of the loose end. The belt tightened instantly drawing him around the engine pulley, bringing the 6 h.p. machine to a dead stop. One of his legs is broken very badly below the knee and his body most severely wrenched. His escape from death was considered by those who saw it as almost miraculous. Everyone who has worked to do with gasoline engines and belts will do well to increase their wariness.
