Embracing one of the most extensive programs ever carried out, Air Cadets in the Maritimes this summer will learn what it is like to be a real aviator. The first groups already have arrived at regular RCAF stations for a ten-day tour at air force life and other things they have been studying air force subjects for months and thus the theory of what a pilot or a navigator does will become practical knowledge before their very eyes. They will watch the pilot operate his plane and the navigator chart his course.
