Not the Spirit of British People

LONDON, March 26—Major Beekles Wilson, in an article in the Daily Express, says that coming back from France he can bear witness to "the dramatic restraint and half smouldering emotional intensity of the French people."

"With English newspapers spread before me," Major Wilson wrote, "I am more than ever struck by the difference in the opportunity offered the foreigner to misunderstand the real spirit of this country, and ever for Englishmen to misunderstand themselves."

"For the last few weeks in England a wave of pessimism and hypercriticalism has been running. So far as my observation goes it is wholly and cruelly unjustifiable.

"If I, an observer from overseas, were asked my impressions of what I have seen, I would say that England at no time in her long history was ever so full of industrious and devoted men and women. Never did England's armies and fleets carry with them so great a measure of love and loyalty as to-day; never was the spirit of England more glorious. But look for this spirit of England in the right place. Do not look for it in the harangues of disappointed politicians, in sensational vapourings of jaundiced journalists. In crowded theatres, restaurants and public places the real spirit of England is. As was said of one great Englishman and repeated the other day of another: "He does not advertise; by some strange whim of character he even hates to reveal himself." But if you pierce behind

SALONIKI, March 25.—The latest news from Constantinople reports that the difficulties of feeding the population are becoming so great that the newspapers are advising the people to leave the capital and go to Asia Minor, where provisions are said to be more plentiful. The Journal Tanine says the people in the capital are literally dying of hunger and misery. It says this is the only term which can be used to describe the conditions of affairs at Constantinople, Brussa, Angora and Smyrna.
