Yugoslav Charges

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 9.—The official Hungarian telegraphic agency today denied charges in the Yugoslav press that large numbers of Yugoslavs have recently been expelled from Hungary. The agency said that this year only 66 Yugoslavs have been deported and none of these in recent weeks.

SPECULATE RE FEDERAL LEGISLATION

Fear Japanese Freighter Lost With All Hands

(Canadian Press, by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—Word of the plight of the Japanese freighter Victoria Maru, struck by a storm in mid-Atlantic was flashed to Ottawa tonight from the radio direction finding station on Execution Island in Hudson Strait. The ship's bridge was swept away by the waves, the captain and first officer killed and the third officer was missing, according to a message intercepted by the station.

SAD FATALITY IN THE CITY YESTERDAY

Body of Mr. William "Dempsey" Diamond Found In His Room With Bullet Wound.

A shocking fatality occurred last evening at the Vendome Hotel, Kent Street, the victim being Mr. William "Dempsey" Diamond, well known to local sport fans, and a former player on the Abegweit hockey team. The deceased had been in a serious motor accident about two years ago, and since that time had been in poor health. His body was found about 8:30 p. m. in his room with a bullet hole in the chest. A .22 revolver was found at his side. Death probably occurred about two hours previous. The harrowing discovery was made by a brother of the deceased, Mr. Spurgeon Diamond who immediately notified Dr. McKenna, the police and the coroner, Mr. James Johnston, Jr., were then notified, and an inquest was decided on, which will be held today at 10 o'clock.

Wireless Destroyed

The Victoria Maru's radio receiving apparatus was apparently out of commission, the Ascania reported. Signals from the ship were weak and subject to considerable interference.
