LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Speaking of the Fishery Award the Premier said Hon. Mr. Sutherland when Minister of Marine and Fisheries was determined to have the question settled but action was delayed by the changing of his portfolio. The question will come up shortly however with every prospect of success. Referring to the re-adjustment of subsidies he spoke of the propositions made by the different Premiers in conference including a demand that Prince Edward Island shall receive \$100,000 for legislation and civil government an increase of \$70,000 over what we are now receiving. The Dominion Government is receiving largely increased amounts from us in the shape of duties, and we have a perfect right to receive an increased amount from them in subsidies. There is a proposition to increase our per capita subsidy from \$0.25 to \$1.00. This would mean an increase of \$21,000, a total of \$91,000. The matter has been before the Government for some time, and it cannot be long before they will consent to the demands of all the provinces, and give them the necessary amount for legislation and civil government.

He claimed that the administration of Justice should be paid by the Dominion Government instead of by the Local Government. The amount we pay is largely out of proportion to our revenues. This province contends that the Dominion should pay not only for administration of justice in the future, but should refund what had been paid since Confederation.

ation. It was highly improper and impolitic for the Opposition to spread broadcast through the country, that our claims are not valid, and the Liberal Government are only using them to catch votes. It goes without saying that unless we get an increase of revenue from some outside source, it will be necessary to resort to increase of taxation within the province.

Mr. Peters explained that the cause of the delay in the opening of the Consolidated Schools, was owing to the illness of Professor J. W. Robertson. As far as agriculture is concerned this province is going ahead by leaps and bounds, and there is no other province that has made such progress, a result largely due to the valuable assistance given by the Government in practical legislation.

W. A. O. Morson moved the adjournment of the debate.

It was adjourned till Tuesday at three p. m.
