(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SAINT JOHN, N. B., March 10—World peace depends upon youth appreciation of present conditions, the Canadian Club here was told by Dr. A. E. Morgan, principal and vice chancellor of McGill University, who is touring the Maritimes. "If the youth of the democratic countries of the world really care for the preservation of the ideals of democracy and personal liberty, with the same singleness of heart that possessed their forefathers, then we may escape retrogression to a cruder or more brutal civilization from which we think we have emerged during centuries of evolution," he said.

OTTAWA, March 10—(CP)—E. J. White, Bathurst, N. B., today was elected Dominion President of the Canadian Postmasters' Association at their annual meeting here. He succeeds Harvard Morgan of Didsbury, Alta.

C. D. Griffiths of Estevan, Sask., was re-elected for a 10th term as secretary-treasurer and J. L. Jackson Salmon Arm, B. C. was elected vice-president.

Recommendations included: That the post office be sole vendor of radio licenses; that postmaster vacancies be filled by promotion and not by advertising; that lower mail rates be established on commercial papers and books and a smaller fee be charged for small C. O. D. parcels; that an educational campaign be conducted to get the public to properly address letters and a more extensive training in this regard in schools was suggested.
