some provision could be made in our City Hospitals for handling the cases, and preventing the spread of the disease. Outside of the two fever cases, the health of our family has been good.

The girls have their own House Council through which they carry on the social activities. They gave a most enjoyable Halloween Party to their friends, and in January a Mock Wedding was the feature of a happy gathering. Each Monday night we have a family talk on ways and means of breaking down careless habits, and also to study how we can be more courteous and thoughtful towards people we meet. On Wednesday evening our Bible Class is held. We are studying the Acts of the Apostles, and the girls have shown great interest by their good attention and answers. Friday night we discuss Missions, remembering in prayer, those of our friends who are in the field, or any special appeal from them.

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We are very grateful to friends who supply us with papers and magazines. They help to break the monotony of study, and also keep the family posted in current events.

Through the kindness of the trustees of The Cundall Estate we have our own typewriter. It has lessened the work in making out monthly reports, and in answering our correspondence. To Mrs. Daniel Davis we are indebted for a pretty picture in the drawing room.

In our Immigration Department we have assisted several travellers, one a little girl of 12 years, who travelled from New York to visit her grandparents in Georgetown; an old lady coming from Detroit to visit her son near Souris, and others.

During last Summer we had a busy time looking after our seventy guests, who came to us from California, British Columbia all parts of Ontario and the Maritimes. The first arrived early in June, and the late ones were loathe to leave when we had to prepare the rooms for the Autumn term. Many letters of appreciation have been received that were delightful to our House and surroundings and enjoyed every day they were with us. We had to refuse accommodation many times, and already letters of inquiry are coming in regarding plans for this year.

We hope that the Tourist Association will double their efforts in showing that Prince Edward Island is an ideal spot in which to spend a holiday. If more views were taken and circulated of our beautiful shores, the sand dunes, and many pretty woodsy points, they certainly would attract the Tourists. We have taken a space in the Tourists Guide Book, also the A. L. A. Guide.

Another part of our work extends to the Community, and although our Gym is small it meets the need of the younger girls. Last year we started classes in the Prince of Wales College Hall, with an instructor in charge. The classes started off well, but with so many other attractions, we found it did not pay to continue them.

This term the work has gone on well in our own Gym. Two groups of Juniors are taking each week our Miss Fuller, and the other by Miss Doris Tait. The Volley Ball team are as enthusiastic as ever. Instead of this exercise reducing weight, it seems to be developing voice culture.

Last Spring several Basketball games were played between our teams. One with Summerside in which our team were the victors. They gave a supper to the visiting team, which closed a jolly evening. The Senior Class opened in January with a fair registration but as our Gym had to be closed they will not continue until after Easter. Through the kindness of the Y. M. C. A. we were able to continue our other classes. Our Silver Cup is held this year by the St. James girls.

Our Associate Secretary has given an outline of the work done by them during the past season, and would like to extend her return by appealing for more Associates. This year our membership is 135, showing an increase of 10, but we should have double that number on our roll. We need women who will be personally interested in the Home and girls. When we realize the number of girls under eighteen years of age in our city and are subject to the temptations that are here, should we not ask, "Are we living and working up to the standard of our Association? Let us make this year the best in the history of this Association, not simply from the material side but in every way our work so carried on that the young girls who leave our Home will have before them a right vision of life, and a realization of the place they should take in the world and the building up of the Master's Kingdom.

In closing my report, I want to thank the trustees of the Board and associates for all their kindness during the past year. I ask your prayers that this Work may be carried on to the Glory of God, and according to His Will.
