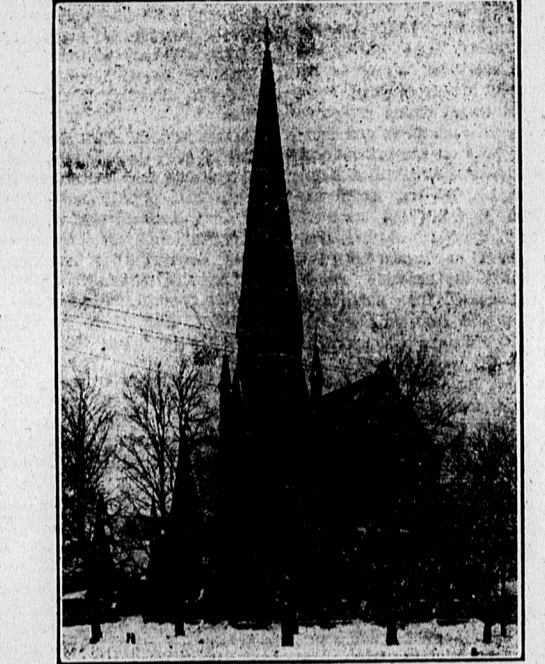

St. James Church Now Renovated

An Interesting Description of the New Interior. (Contributed)

The building is constructed of Wallace free stone in the main part of the walls, the facing stones of buttresses, windows, etc., are of Island stone.

The internal arrangements and seating of the church as originally constructed differed from the external design so that the congregation entering, instead of facing the pulpit and choir, entered at right angles.

This re-arrangement gives the worshippers an opportunity of seeing the rich beauty of the architectural setting and stained glass effects. The two side galleries have been removed, the only one remaining being that in the East facing the chancel.
