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### PHLEBOTOMY.

By which term our older readers will recognize a favorite specific of fifty or more years ago. Phlebotomy, or bleeding, was the cure-all, regardless of the nature of the disease. If a man was sick he was promptly bled; if he did not get better he was bled again; if he died it was because he would not bleed any more.

On scientific grounds which, for our present purpose, it is not necessary to examine, this method of treatment was abandoned and that of—in un-medical terms—pouring more blood into the victim of disease substituted. The result of the change has proved satisfactory. People still die but, if medical statistics are to be relied upon, more diseases have been conquered and death more frequently turned aside than by the old method of bleeding.

Although abandoned as a form of medical treatment the custom of bleeding still lingers, in various shapes, in many localities. Fortunately it, too, is going the way of the lancet and bandage and will soon, it is hoped, be numbered with the lost arts. The latter form is directed at the pocket. The patient may be an enterprise seeking a foothold in a city, an employe, an applicant for a position or in fact any institution or any person that seeks by honest or dishonest means to make a livelihood.

An enterprise seeks to establish itself in a city. It may be an uncertain venture. That but a very small percentage of criminals have strayed away from the love of a good wife or mother.  
There are breaks, it will be admitted. The young man seen reeling on the street last Sunday, his face cut and bleeding, may have strayed away from a mother who loved him and would have given her life to save him. He strayed because of an appetite created by yielding to a temptation that is all too common, because the means to gratify that appetite are also too common through the laxity of law enforcement for which the men, whose duty it is to enforce it, are wholly to blame. Is there no influence that the women of Charlottetown can bring to bear upon these men to induce them to enforce the law? Have they really tried it? Have they gone in a body or by delegation to the prosecutor with information which would assist him to enforce the law? Have they gone to the government with a suggestion as to how the law may be better enforced? If they have, and have failed, would our fair correspondent advocate the use of brickbats on the saunions or on the offices of the law officials? We believe that the women of Charlottetown, banded together in a common determination to have the law enforced, would bring such influence to bear upon the government and its officials that violation of the law would be impossible. The trouble is that, while there are individual women and individual men who strongly desire to see the liquor evil banished from our midst, there has not been a systematic, persistent, determined, concerted effort to this end on the part of either men or women. Until such concerted action is taken by the majority of our men and women there shall be no radical enforcement of the Prohibition Act. Mutual recrimination will do no good. The men made the laws for their own and the women's protection. The men should enforce them and good women should use their influence, as good men are doing, to have them enforced.

(2) Yes, please. Women, like men, look better, feel and do better when in the same state. See what the untamed women of England have done for themselves.  
(3) Yes, always going, not as the women of England are going, but as He who gave the command in that second garden meant that His followers should go, to do good, to win the world to Himself, not with brickbats but with the power of lives consecrated to His service and to humanity.
