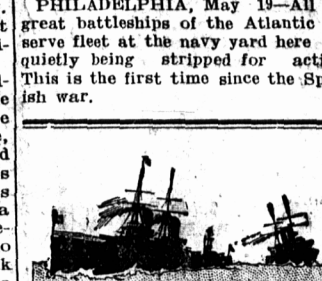

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES G. FRANCIS.

I.; George of Wetakansig, Alberta; Robert, of Boston, Mass.; and Philip S., of Moncton, while the sisters are: Mrs. Annie Woodworth, of Chelsea, Mass.; Mrs. Thomas Cameron, of Hampton, N. B.; Mrs. William Muirhead of Tryon, P. E. I., and Mrs. Thomas A. Cobb, of Crapaud, P. E. I.
The funeral service will be held at the house on Saturday afternoon, to be conducted by the Rev. G. A. Lawson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, after which the remains will be taken to the depot and taken to his old home in Crapaud, P. E. I., and where interment will be made on Sunday afternoon.
