IMPORTANT CONFERENCE.—An important conference, under the direction of an advisory committee composed of representatives of the Anglican, Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian and Christian churches, will be held in Charlottetown, November 15th to 18th. The object of this Conference is to make such arrangements as may be deemed advisable for the training of boys growing up in the Sunday Schools for positions of leadership and responsibility in Christian work. The terrible drainage of Christian leadership among the young men through enlistment makes such a move as this vitally necessary to the future of the churches. The leadership for the Conference will include Mr. Lou A. Buckley, Maritime Boy's Secretary, Y. M. C. A.; Mr. I. W. Williamson, Baptist Sunday School Secretary; Rev. W. A. Ross, Secretary, Sunday School Association and other leaders qualified for work with boys. The leaders will meet on November 15 to 16; the boys on November 16 to 18. All interested in Christian work are asked to remember these dates and to lend what assistance they can in making the Conference a success.

SCHOONER IN TROUBLE.—The Halifax Mail says: The boisterous weather off the Nova Scotia coast during the past few days has sent one lame duck into Halifax, the American three-masted schooner, J. F. Seavey, Captain William Kelson, now lying sparsely at Hendry's wharf. The dismasted vessel was towed into port at eight o'clock Tuesday morning by a Canadian cruiser. The squall which removed the spars from the vessel made a neat job of it as the three masts snapped off clean at the deck. While Captain Kelson regrets the misfortune that overtook his vessel he is more than glad that his crew escaped, although all hands had a very close call, so close that they do not care going through the same experience again. To a Mail reported, Captain Kelson said that he left Gaspé, P. Q., a week ago today with a cargo of 424,000 feet of lumber, bound to New York. Took the northern route arrived Prince Edward Island to the Strait of Canso where he harbored for a day and again sought shelter at Country Harbor. Sunday morning everything looked favorable for a dandy run down the coast and across the mouth of the Bay of Fundy to the New England coast.

WORKMEN AND SOLDIERS DRAW PEACE PROGRAM

PETROGRAD, Oct. 24.—The Russian peace program, as drawn up by the central executive committee of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates in the form of instructions to M. Skobelev, ex-Minister of Labor, consists of fifteen articles covering the whole ground from Panama to Persia. The program of the central executive committee follows:

First—Evacuation by the Germans of Russia and autonomy of Poland, Lithuania and the Lettish provinces. Second—Autonomy of Turkish Armenia. Third—Solution of the Alsace-Lorraine question by a plebiscite, the voting being arranged by local civil authorities after the removal of all the troops of both belligerents.

Fourth—Restoration to Belgium of her ancient frontiers and compensation for her losses from an international fund.

Fifth—Restoration of Serbia and Montenegro with similar compensation. Serbia to have access to the Adriatic. Bosnia and Herzegovina to be autonomous.

Sixth—Disputed Balkan districts to receive provisional autonomy followed by a plebiscite.

Seventh—Rumania to be restored her old frontiers on condition that they grant Dobruja autonomy and grant equal rights to Jews.

Eighth—Autonomy for the Italian provinces of Austria to be followed by a plebiscite.

Ninth—Restitution of all colonies to Germany.

Tenth—Re-establishment of Greece and Persia.

Abolish Torpedo Attacks

Eleventh—Neutralization of all Straits leading to inner seas and also the Suez and Panama canals. Freedom of navigation for merchant ships. Abolition of the right to torpedo merchant ships in war time.

Twelfth—All belligerents to renounce war contributions or indemnities in any form, but the money spent on the maintenance of prisoners and all contributions levied during the war to be returned.

No Secret Treaties. Thirteenth—Commercial treaties not to be based on the peace treaty; each country may act independently with respect to its commercial policy, but all countries to engage to renounce an economic blockade after the war.

Fourteenth—The conditions of peace should be settled by a peace congress consisting of delegates elected by the people and confirmed by Parliament. Diplomats must engage not to conclude secret treaties, which hereby are declared contrary to the rights of the people and consequently void.

Fifteenth—Gradual disarmament by land and sea and the establishment of a non-military system.
