THE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Quarterly Meeting Held at Montague Bridge—Interesting and Profitable Sessions at That Place.

The 38th session of the P. E. I. Baptist Association opened at Montague on the 29th, with Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, Moderator in the chair. After devotional exercises the election of officers resulted as follows:—

Rev. J. Webb, Moderator; Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, Clerk; Ross Bethune, Assistant Clerk; N. J. McDonald, Treasurer. Rev. D. Price, Bro. A. W. Sterns, Bro. A. Simpson were appointed a committee of arrangements.

The following appointments were made to Committees:—Rev. D. Price to Obituary Com. Home Missions—Bros. A. A. McLean, Jas. McLean.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON. After devotional services Rev. D. Price submitted the report on obituaries. Mention was made of the loss sustained by the denomination in the death of the late Deacons Howatt, Tryon, and Scantlebury, Charlottetown, also the deaths of Mrs Jacob Bain, Mrs. William Scott and Mrs Malcolm McNeill. The report was adopted after remarks by A. Simpson, and Rev. D. Price. Rev. Dr. Manning was given a seat in the Conference.

A. W. Sterns read the statement of the denominational funds and Rev. J. G. A. Belyea read the report of the Committee on Systematic Benevolence. This was discussed by A. W. Sterns, Rev. G. R. White, A. Simpson, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea. The report was adopted and Mr Belyea was asked to have it published in the denominational paper.

The report on Temperance was read by Rev. D. W. Crandall. The first clause recommended a Temperance sermon in every church on Temperance Sunday. Clause 2 recommended temperance teaching and instruction in Sunday Schools and the Public Schools. Clause 3 recommended church members to support temperance men in politics. Clause 4 urged continued agitation and effort in every way till prohibition is secured. The report was adopted.

FRIDAY EVENING. After opening, A. Simpson read the report of the committee of Church Government. The report on Education was read by Rev. G. R. White. The reports were adopted and the meeting was addressed by Rev. D. Price, Dr. Manning and Rev. J. Webb. Session closed with prayer by Dr. Manning.

FRIDAY MORNING. A. A. McLean lead the devotional meeting. The digest of letter was given by Rev. J. G. A. Belyea. The right hand of fellowship was given by the Moderator to the pastor of the Kingston church and he was received into the Association. The invitation of the Tryon church to meet with them next year was accepted. The state of the denomination as shown by the letters was discussed by Rev. G. R. White, A. Simpson, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea and others. The report on denominational literature was read by Rev. J. D. Wetmore and adopted.

The opening services in the evening meeting were conducted by Licentiate Howlett. Rev. J. D. Wetmore delivered an eloquent discourse in the Baptist church and Rev. J. W. Gardner spoke in the Methodist Church.

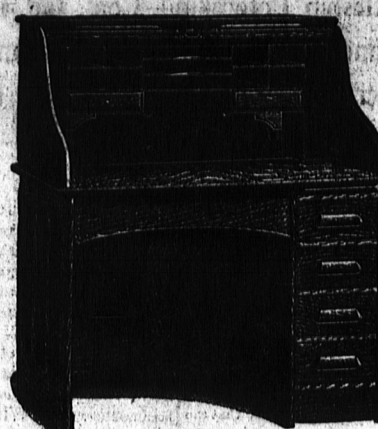

A By-law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1905.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st—A discount at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent shall be allowed all taxpayers who shall on or before the 15th day of July, next, A.D. 1905 pay to the City Clerk at his office the taxes severally due by them for the current year on real estate and personal property for civic purposes.
