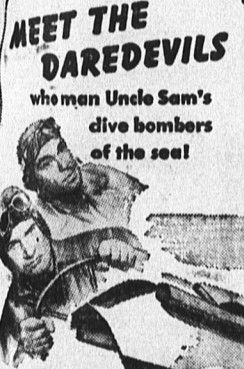

radio broadcast a dispatch by Domei, Japanese news and propaganda agency, saying 61 survivors of the Angarstrol had arrived at Dairen on their way to the Soviet Union. Dairen is a port at the top of the Kwantung peninsula of southern Manchuria.

The German radio on June 21 said the Japanese Foreign Office had called the attention of its ambassador to Ruxia "to the possibility that the freighter was sunk by a United States submarine in an effort to create friction between the Soviet Union and Japan."

The Berlin accounts said Japanese announced that on the same day at almost the same spot where the Soviet vessel was sunk a Japanese vessel was torpedoed by a United States submarine.
