### THE CARRIER SYSTEM.

Desiring to test public opinion in this city as to the desirability of introducing a system of free delivery of letters by carriers, The Guardian has prepared the coupon printed on another page of this issue, giving to all persons interested the opportunity of expressing their views for or against the proposed change. We trust there may be a general response from all citizens who have any preference in the matter.

Few are perhaps aware of the great defects of the present system, notably in regard to the failure of a great many of persons to receive the letters addressed to them. Hundreds of persons do not visit the Post Office for months at a time. In the meantime letters reach the Post Office addressed to such persons, and not being called for, these letters are sent to the Dead Letter Office. Enquiry at the Post Office elicits the information that from one hundred to one hundred and twenty-five letters addressed to persons in Charlottetown are thus disposed of weekly throughout the year.

No possible blame attaches to the post office officials or clerks in this matter. Their business is to sort the letters, place in boxes those addressed to box-holders and to deliver at the general delivery any mail matter for other persons when called for. They cannot be expected to carry the letters to the persons addressed, nor have they any legal permit or authority to do so. And yet there is sometimes a world of unrecorded anxiety, sorrow and heartbreak behind these undelivered letters. Estrangements between dear friends and members of families losing all trace of each other are frequent results.

Merchants who make large use of the mails in sending circulars or bills to their customers sometimes object that there would be additional postage to pay under the carrier system. This is true, but with it would come the certainty that their letters reached the persons addressed instead of being sent to the Dead Letter Office in hundreds and thousands as is now the case. A fair consideration of this fact will, we believe, convince our merchants that the carrier system would be of great advantage to them and much preferable to the plan now in vogue. Be that as it may, there can be no doubt that the carrier system would be an inestimable boon to many who receive only occasional letters and who do not visit the Post Office every day, as well as to hundreds of others who would have their letters brought to their doors instead of making a daily tramp to the Post Office, often in inclement weather.

New York is punishing fraudulent voters in the late mayoralty election with wholesome severity. Two to four years in the penitentiary is the penalty, and it is not too much. We hope to see like wholesome checks put upon illegal election practices in this country, where election frauds have heretofore been treated with too much leniency.

Cuba has successfully passed through a general election, and although mob-violence was at one time during the campaign strongly feared, the polling passed off quietly and the Moderates—the supporters of President Palma—have won. It is comforting to find the Cubans thus settling down to an orderly working of their democratic institutions as a self-governing community.

The treaty executed November 17 between Japan and Korea has been published. It shows that Japan has lost no time in gathering in the fruits of her victory. Hereafter Japan is to control the foreign affairs of Korea, will maintain a Japanese Resident at Seoul and Japanese customs directors at all Korean ports. It is a practical annexation. Korea becomes to all intents and purposes a province of Japan and its business affairs will be directed from Tokio.

Toronto Saturday Night, one of the bright independent journals of the Ontario capital, predicts that if ex-Premier Haultain is beaten in the Saskatchewan elections "it will be a distinct gain to federal politics for he will doubtless find a seat in the House of Commons and lead in a movement which will sweep this country from the Atlantic to the Pacific." Saturday Night holds a very high estimate of Mr. Haultain's ability, patriotism and worth and believes he is a coming man in the politics of the Dominion.

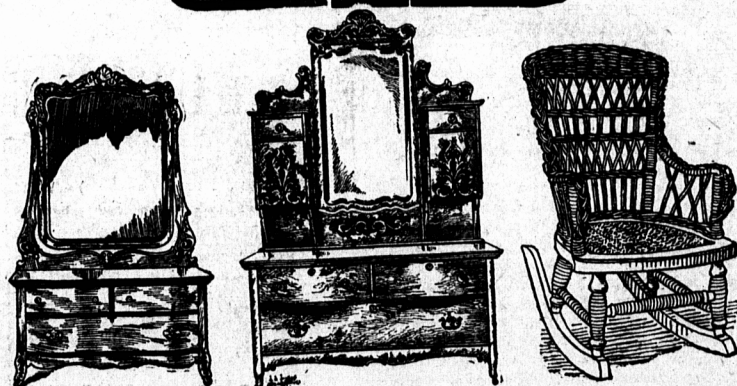

### JUST HOW WE STAND.

The following is an extract from a speech delivered by B. Hal. Brown, Manager of the London & Lancashire Life Insurance Co. for Canada:

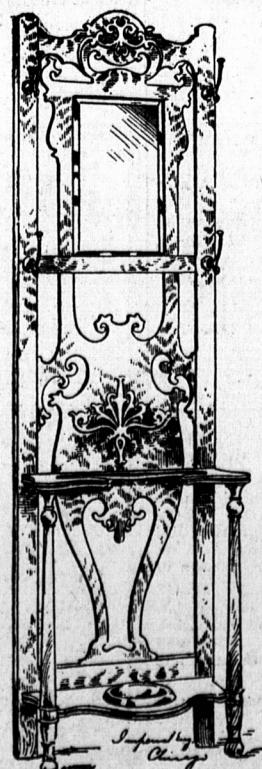
