Expect Improvement In Potato Supply

OTTAWA, June 28 (CP) - Prices Board officials said today that the current low potato supply situation which they described as normal for this time of year, will improve within a week or 10 days with the arrival of further shipments of United States stocks.

They said that while stocks will be low during the next two weeks there will be enough for normal consumption if consumers refrained from buying more than their immediate requirements.

Stocks of potatoes usually are low during this season when Canada relies on American imports until new domestic potatoes appear on the market. The situation has been aggravated this year by heavy United States lend-lease commitments.
