**SUE GREAT BRITAIN FOR DETENTION ON PRUSSIAN LINER.**

**PHILADELPHIA,** March 19.—T. Cuyler Patterson, an attorney of this city, and thirty-four other Americans have filed claims against the British Government for \$1,000 each because of their detention on the Hamburg-American liner Prinz Adalbert in Fal-mouth harbor from last August 4 to August 8, according to a statement by Mr. Patterson here last night. "The act of the British in seizing the Prinz Adalbert the night before they declared war," said the statement "was an act of piracy on the high seas, the passengers of the vessel drew up resolutions protesting against this action before they left the ship, and as soon as they landed they filed their claims with American Ambassador Page.

"The matter recently was re-opened by President Wilson and the State department asked me to draw up a statement of our claims. I did so and the matter is now probably the subject of discussion between the department of state and the British foreign office."

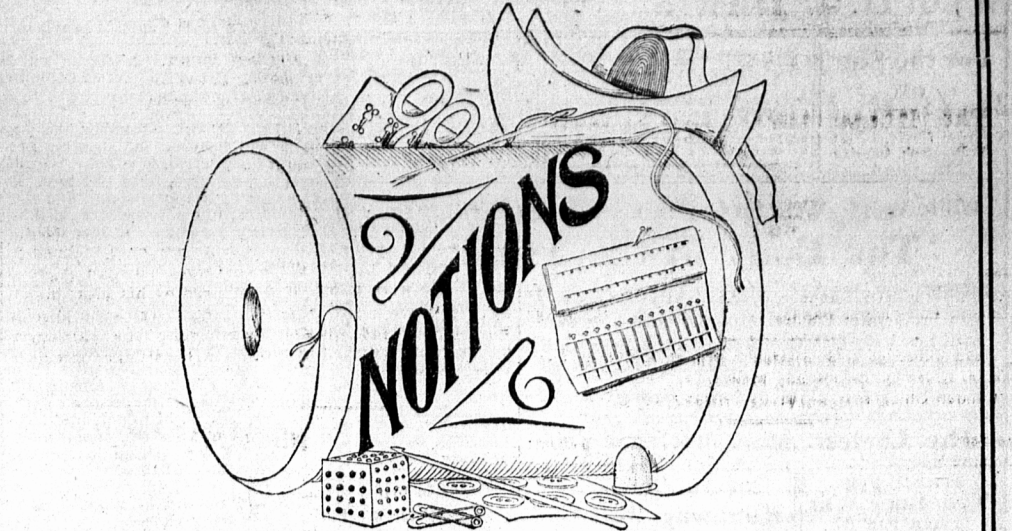
