**ODOR OF DEATH FROM MARNE REGION**

PARIS, July 31.—An eye-witness on the banks of the Marne thus describes the scenes of desolation in the wake of the German retreat: "Clusters of dead Germans are seen on all sides of the big wheat-covered plain. The Marne scintillates in the sunshine. A lone bird sings on a tree. But the two artilleries seek steeds and woods. When the roar ceases occasionally, it is as if one was transported suddenly to a calm sylvan retreat—then comes the odor of death."
