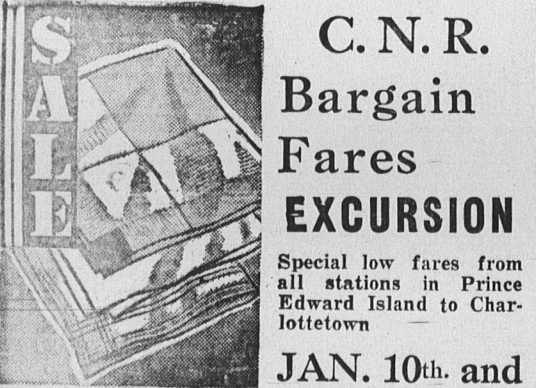

## Japs protest To Britain in Examination cases

TOKYO, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A Japanese protest to Britain, based on abuse of belligerent rights in the examination of Japanese trans-Atlantic travellers at Bermuda, was announced by the government today.

Ambassador Sir Robert Craigie received the protest from Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka in a one-hour conference.

At the same time Sir Robert objected to the use of the Japanese flag by German raiders in the south Pacific.

The cabinet information bureau stated Matsuoka's protest names "that measures taken by British authorities at Bermuda clearly are an abuse of belligerent rights and an illegal act infringing the legitimate rights and freedom of movement of subjects of Japan, which is a neutral country."

"The Foreign Minister," it added, "demands that the British Government promptly take satisfactory steps for settlement of the case."

Nine Japanese passengers, arriving Saturday at Lisbon aboard the American export liner "Exeter," were confined to their cabins for five hours at Bermuda by British contraband control officers. They declared the control officers confiscated their cash and travellers' cheques.

A Domei Japanese news agency, broadcast from Tokyo quoted reports that Japan had decided on retaliation against "unreasonable" use of navicerts—Britain's system of certifying cargoes on exporters' ports.

Japan, Domei said, contends that the use of navicerts is a violation of international law and will protest every time Britain applies them to Japanese ships.

## Italy ready to Fight to finish

ROME, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Italy let it be known today in spite of her defeat at Bardia and President Roosevelt's plan for increased United States aid to Britain, she intends to fight to the finish as an Axis partner.

"However gigantic the British Empire's resources appear on paper and the promises with the United States means are more immediately and more powerfully efficient," wrote Virginia Gens, Foreign editor who voices the thoughts of Mussolini.

"History must belong to the Axis."

Not until today did the high command give the Italian people the news of the British capture Sunday of Bardia, strong Italian base in Eastern Libya.

The high command communique spoke of the courage of the defending forces and omitted any mention that British advance mechanized units have penetrated Libya to a point south of Tobruk. The government announced a \$2,000,000,000 budget for the coming year, exclusive of probable war costs. Italy has a budget deficit of about \$1,402,000,000 for the past fiscal year.

The cabinet with Mussolini presiding, adopted resolution "firmly reaffirming" Italy's adherence to the alliance with Germany and the principle pact with the Axis and Japan and affirmed Italy's determination to fight on.

The deep masses of "Fascist" Italy are and will be in every circumstance equal to events," the resolution said.

Gayda's opinion of Roosevelt's message to the United States Congress Monday was that it was a reiteration of "the outworn unproved theme" of an Axis menace to America, while assuring Americans of "the material impossibility" of an Axis attack.

## Will consider Responsibilities Of Municipalities

TORONTO, Jan. 7.—(CP)—Mayor Fred Conboy told a Toronto Service Club today that responsibilities of municipalities in respect to payment for social services should be considered at the forthcoming Federal-Provincial conference.

"Prime Minister of Canada decided," he said, "that municipalities would not be represented at the conference, but I am sure that provincial members of legislatures will bring the subject before the conference."

The mayor said that social services should be largely by the Federal and Provincial Governments because they were personal services and should not be a direct tax on real estate. He said that they were essential to a large city, they contributed nothing to the value of real estate.

Looking forward to a time when the only unemployed in Toronto would be unemployables, Dr. Conboy urged that the cost of these persons should be shared by the Federal, Provincial and Municipal governments on a 40-40-20 basis. He noted that relief overhead here was being reduced and that one relief office was about to be closed.

Relief rolls have lowered 65 per cent in Toronto and within six months probably only unemployables will be jobless in this city," he said. Relief costs, however, would not be reduced directly because they had been funded over a period of five years.

## U. S. Admiral Is optimistic

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Rear Admiral John H. Towers gave Congress a guardedly optimistic forecast on United States naval aircraft production but said the navy soon would recommend a change in the Walsh-Healey public contracts act further to expedite the work.

Testifying at the opening of a House of Representatives naval committee inquiry into the progress of the two-ocean navy program, the chief of naval aeronautics said that while the fleet's air strength had a net increase of only 445 planes last year, approximately 4,000 additional aircraft would be delivered during the current year. This would give the navy a total of about 6,500 planes.

Congress has authorized 15,000 naval aircraft.

Towers said an initial lag had been experienced in getting the \$33,000,000 naval aircraft program rolling but predicted that, in the light of what had happened in British aviation production, the output would exceed estimates as

## expanded plants got into full swing.

Towers said the navy department is working on "quite an extensive list" of legislative recommendations which are designed to facilitate the work on both the aircraft and ship construction programs.

The admiral expressed belief that everything possible is being done to eliminate "bottlenecks," although, he said, there would continue to be a shortage of airplane engines for another 18 months.

## Evacuated British Children "Adopted" By Canadian Troops

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—(Special)—More than 2,000 evacuated British children, typical of the thousands sent to the continent to escape air raids, were "adopted" on Christmas Day by units of the 2nd Canadian Division.

Delayed information reaching here from Lieut.-Col. D. E. MacIntyre, D. S. O., M. C., general manager of the Canadian Legion War Services, who is at present overseas, tells of a Yuletide party arranged "somewhere in England" by the Legion during which the children and the men enjoyed juvenile movies and professional concert a t.i.s.s. Distinguished guests of the party was Major-General Victor Odium, C. B., C.M.G., Commander of the 2nd Division overseas.

Directed by M. McIndrye, Head of Toronto Legion super-entertainer, the party was a huge success, every man of the unit present giving a gift to a child. To top it all off the Legion sent to the men and the kiddies at a rollicking good supper party. Gifts from the Legion to the packages of cigarettes and books & matches.
