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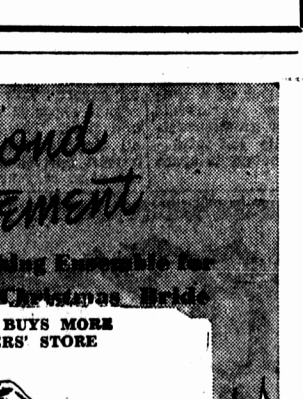
MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—Charging Prime Minister Mackenzie King with being "too small to admit his mistakes," the creator of the black market and anti-French, Ivan Sabourin, K.C., leader of the provincial Progressive Conservative Party, addressed a gathering of the Montreal-Hochelaga Progressive Conservative Association on Saturday night.

Referring to the prime minister's speech in Quebec on Friday, Mr. Sabourin said, "It is obvious that Mr. King laughs at the people. Too small to admit his own mistakes, too busy with external affairs to see the troubles in our own country, he simply declares to his Liberal friends 'I have nothing to reproach myself with. It's all your fault.' Your lack of organization explains the three successive losses of the party in Pontiac, Portage la Prairie and Parkdale—three defeats in three different provinces of Canada."

Of state socialism and the bureaucracy which Mr. Sabourin charged the prime minister with establishing in Canada, Mr. King said nothing. Of Communism which he tolerated and still tolerates, not a word. Of the black market which he created in Canada—not a word. Of the mortal blow he gave last June to the sacred guarantees of the right of the French language as an official language, violating therefore the pact of Confederation, mortal blows repeated in Quebec, not a word.

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Mt'l. Restaurateur
Has Licence Cancelled

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—A Montreal restaurateur who furnished bond for hundreds of Witnesses of Jehovah had his liquor licence cancelled and his stock removed today as the Provincial Government renewed its drive against the sect which Premier Duplessis charged is distributing "seditious propaganda."

Representatives of the permit department of the Quebec Liquor Commission presented Frank Roncarelli with formal notice of cancellation of his liquor licence and demanded return of his permit. The liquor and beer stock was taken away in a Commission truck. Earlier today it was learned that action has been taken by the Witnesses against the City of Montreal for \$15,000 damages arising from frequent arrests of members of the sect here. In addition, the Superior Court was

asked to declare that members of the sect are Christian ministers, members of a religious body and entitled to exercise their profession as ministers without being subject to arrest. Mr. Roncarelli, who has put up more than \$88,000 in bonds for Witnesses charged with distributing circulars without a city licence, said he was given no reason for cancellation of his restaurant liquor licence. The cafe itself was not closed and continued to serve meals.
