Prince Of Wales College Graduates, 1948



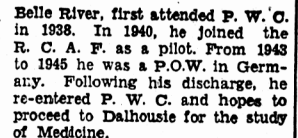

Local Man Returns From Attending Fur Fashion Show

Mr. A. G. Hogan, manager of the Island Furriers has recently returned from Montreal, Toronto and other important Canadian fur centers. While in Montreal, he had the pleasure of being especially invited to the first annual Canadian Fur Fashion Award Show held in the ballroom of the Mount Royal Hotel.

Mr. Hogan reports drastic changes in fur styling with new and larger collars being the major feature. There are of course many types of design from the small shawl collar to the large cape style. Much more fur has been added to the sweep of the coats, some measuring as much as 120 inches but most coats using approximately 90 inches. These full backs lend a very graceful rippling effect. Lengths are of course longer than shown in the last season's styles. All together the styles are more beautiful and practical than shown for many years. Trimmings of contrasting furs are shown to some extent, with the new regal Koliner Mink being used extensively on black Persian Lamb. The Canadian Fur Fashion Award Show was an outstanding success, attended by prominent furriers from all parts of Canada. The show was officially opened by His Worship Mayor Houde of Montreal. The importance of a nation-wide trade industry exhibit cannot be too strongly stressed. The object in presenting awards was to stimulate fashion consciousness in manufacturers with the hope that Canadian styling will eventually rank on a par with other style centres throughout the world. Rightly so, Canada should bow to no country for styling, processing or workmanship in furs. It is noteworthy that in no other country can a young woman of average income wear the quality of furs she is able to purchase in Canada.

Predict Speed-up In Housing Construction

OTTAWA, May 3—The Government tonight predicted housing construction will be speeded up this year. The crown-owned Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation estimated in a statement that 192,000 units have been completed since Jan. 1, 1945. It quoted the Dominion Bureau of Statistics as saying there were about 77,000 completions last year, a gain of 10,000 over 1944. One factor in the increased activity last year was the greater supply of building materials.

Pope Pius Plans To Hold Consistory

VATICAN CITY, May 3—(Reuters)—Pope Pius has invited all Cardinals to attend a consistory, a supreme council of the Roman Catholic Church, at the end of May or early in June, reliable Vatican circles said today. In these circles it is believed that the Pope will take the opportunity to nominate new cardinals to bring the Sacred College up to full strength. It has 10 vacancies at present.
