The annual smoker of No. 4 Co., 4th Reg. C. A., was held in the C. M. B. A. Hall, Souris, on the evening of the King's Birthday.

At the police court yesterday morning Mrs. F. McNeill, Sydney street for a violation of the Prohibition Act was fined \$100. The case against George Offer charging same offence was dismissed. William Cameron for drunkenness was fined \$2 or 10 days.

YESTERDAY a report was current that a great number of cases of diphtheria were to be found in the city. Upon enquiry THE GUARDIAN learned from the Health Officers that at the present time four cases were under quarantine. It is peculiar that the outbreak in each case has not been near where cases previously existed. On Sydney Street two houses are placarded, one on Oiebar and one on Grafton Street have also been quarantined. The use of anti toxin has been effectual in every instance. When located the cases are found to be of the ordinary type, but as soon as anti toxin is administered improvement is almost immediate.

The following additional particulars of the appended marriage have been received: On the 5th instant, the home of Archibald Thomson, Darnley, was the scene of an interesting and joyous event when his daughter Carrie Maud and Alfred William Woodside were united in marriage. Many guests assembled, and the spirit of happiness and cheer pervaded the gathering. The groom's official supporter was Wallace T. Pickering, while Loxena Woodside and Ethel McGowan were charming bridesmaids, and Rev. William A. Thomson of Margate, the bride's cousin performed the ceremony. The numerous valuable presents, and frequent expressions of goodwill from the friends bore testimony to the popularity of the newly united pair.

We regret to chronicle the death of Mr. D. J. MacLeod which took place at his father's residence, Valleyfield, P. E. I. on the morning of the 4th inst. Mr. MacLeod was a young man of brilliant parts and great promise whose death is a distinct loss to the cause to which he had consecrated his life and to the church for whose ministry he was preparing himself. He had completed two years of his course in Dalhousie College and last Spring was appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Presbyterian church as student catechist to Pleasant Bay, Cape Breton. Here he laboured diligently, zealously and with much acceptance all the end of September when he was stricken with a malignant fever against which he heroically struggled and to the effects of which he finally succumbed. For weeks his case was watched with painful interest, by the whole community and earnest were the prayers offered that a life of such usefulness and promise might be spared, but God willed otherwise and with Christian resignation and radiant joyous assurance of his Father's welcome he obeyed the summons, to "come up higher." The funeral which took place on Wednesday was one of the largest in the history of the community, the procession being a mile and a quarter in length. The services were conducted by the Revd. Messrs. Sutherland, MacLean and MacNeill. To the bereaved friends we extend our sympathy while we are assured that their sorrow is tempered by the memory and example of Christian life vouchsafed in the earthly career of the son and brother whose loss is so deeply regretted. The deceased was a brother of Rev. John M. MacLeod, New Mills, N. B. and of Revd. A. D. MacLeod, Zionville, N. B. (Presbyterian Witness, Patriot and Examiner please copy.

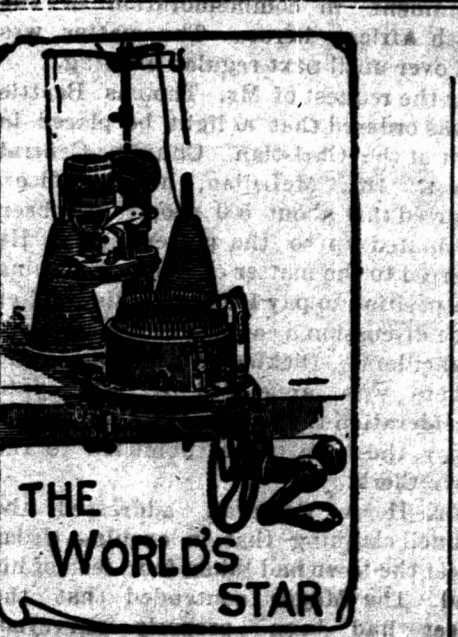

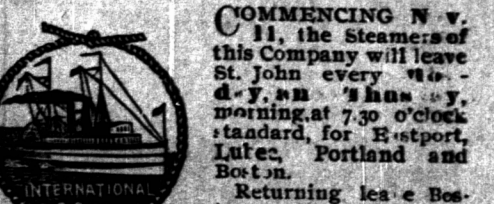
