The tenth session of Kent-Northumberland District Division S. of T. convened in Richibucto Temperance Hall New Castle, N. B., last week. The quarterly meeting of the Presbytery of P. E. I. met in St. James Hall yesterday and was largely attended by ministers from all parts of the Province. The forenoon session was largely taken up by a conference on church life and work especially as regards prayer meeting services and the winning of the young to show an interest in church work.

In the afternoon Rev. Mr. Fullerton presented his motion on Church Union which was seconded by Rev. Donald McNeill as follows: That the Presbytery while thankfully acknowledging the benefits that the denominations interested have received from the conference held on the subjects of Union would humbly suggest that it is inexpedient to incur further expenses by protracting negotiations owing to the manifest division of opinions in the church. Rev. R. G. Strathie moved an amendment, seconded by Rev. John Gellis as follows: The Presbytery thankfully acknowledges the benefits that the denominations interested have received from the conferences on the subject of Union and would again express the hope that all obstacles may be satisfactorily removed and that the ultimate basis of union may be such as will approve of its self to the church as a whole. A very helpful discussion on the subject of Union followed in which nearly all the members of the Presbytery participated. When the vote was taken up the amendment carried by a large majority.

The accidental death by drowning of Hector M. McDonald in Alaska and which was referred to at the time occurred on the 1st Nov. last. Not until this spring, although a diligent search was made at the time was the body found. It was the wish of his friends that if possible the body would be forwarded to his Island home, but decomposition having set in it was found impossible to do so, consequently he had to be buried in Skagway, Alaska. The deceased was a native of Garfield Belfast and was in the 40th year of his age. He was a man of noble and generous disposition and was highly esteemed and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. About twenty years ago he went to the Pacific Coast and worked in San Francisco till the gold fever broke out in Klondyke, when he made his way out to those inhospitable regions. Friends in San Francisco were gladly waiting for his return to spend the winter with them as he anticipated doing, when the sad news came that on going aboard the steamer he tripped over a guard rail and was drowned. The news of his death came to his aged mother just as she returned from the funeral of her brother and on hearing of it she was completely prostrated. He leaves to mourn his death besides his mother, two brothers, Neil in Murray Harbor North and John F. on the old homestead, also four sisters Mrs. Squires and Sarah in New Bedford; Mrs. Blake in Roseberry, and Cassie M. in San Francisco, Cal. besides a large circle of friends and acquaintances.
