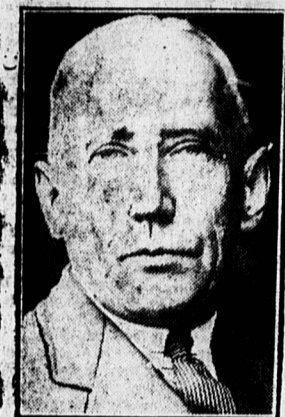

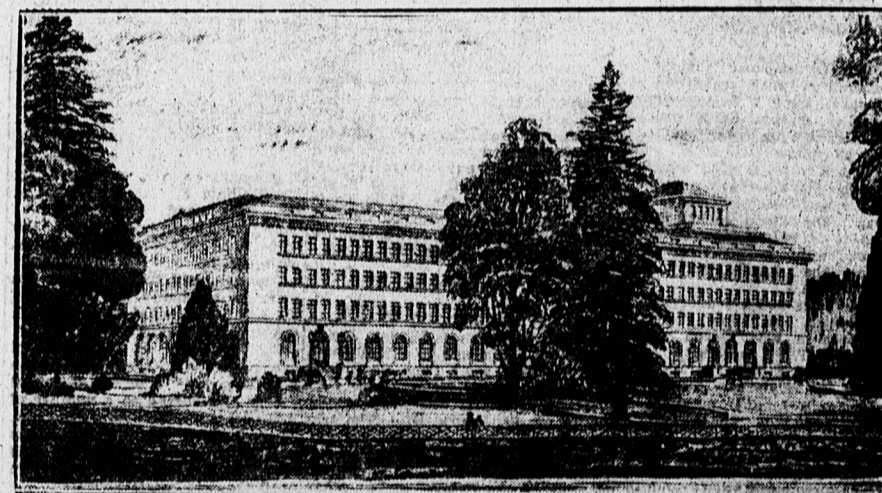
No, this isn't Secretary Hughes of the United States, but a carpenter, William Stowe, who bears a striking resemblance to him. He is making toys in a New York shop.

The crinoline of our grandmothers' younger days is coming back to take the place of the long, slender silhouette effect. This unusual evening gown will be sure to attract attention



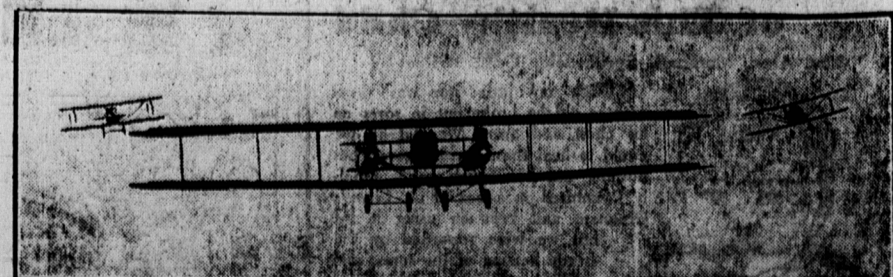
