## DANGER OF NEWSPAPER BOYCOTT.

The proprietor of an Indiana newspaper has brought suit against the county superintendent of education for \$10,000 damages for organizing a boycott on his paper, says the New Orleans Item. He alleges that the superintendent caused resolutions to be adopted at a teachers' institute denouncing his paper, in which the teachers pledged themselves not to patronize the paper or any merchant who advertised in the paper. This suit will be watched with great interest, as it involves a far-reaching question. If a body of men combine to injure another in his business they commit an unlawful act, and if the man can show that he has been injured they are legally responsible for the damage.

Recently a case was decided in Chicago, in which the boycotters were held liable for damages for warning merchants not to patronize or sell goods to one who was holding out against a strike. The fact that the boycott was not a corporation was held not to be material. Every man of the union, as an individual, was held liable for damages. In the union there were many men of property, accumulated by hard work, and these men will have to respond in damages for voting with the others in favor of the boycott. The result of this suit should teach men who are unable that it is unsafe to take part in a boycott. The result of this suit, and of others that have been begun will be that no man possessing any property will combine with others in boycotting.

## THE PLAGUE IN MEXICO.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Jan. 20.—According to a letter received here from Beazantian, Mexico deaths from Babonic Plague are averaging 33 per cent. Up to January 5, two days before the letter was written, there had been over 150 deaths. Fully a third of the population of 15,000 has fled.

## WHERE IS NOVA SCOTIA GIRL?

BOSTON, Jan. 21.—Minnie Graham, a native of Seaford, Halifax county, Nova Scotia, mysteriously disappeared from her home at Taunton, Mass., December 30, and cannot be located. Miss Graham, who was to have been married shortly, is 27 years old, weighed 145 pounds, and was 5 feet 5 inches tall.

## ASK DWAGER TO RESIGN.

PEKIN, Jan. 21.—The censors have memorialized the Dowager Empress, asking her to resign in favor of the Emperor, and declaring that her retirement will be the first step in the direction of reform. The Dowager is much annoyed by the memorial, which is an expression of the best native opinion, the first that has been heard officially since 1900.
