Baked Tomatoes

- 6 or more firm ripe tomatoes
 - 1 chopped green pepper
 - 1 tablespoon chopped chicken
 - 1 tablespoon chopped ham
 - 1 cup thick soup stock
 - 1 cup fresh bread crumbs
 - Salt and pepper to taste
- Wash and cut out centres of tomatoes, saving the hearts to mix in with the filling. Fry the pepper in butter until soft, add the chicken, ham and the soup stock. Into this stir the chopped tomato hearts, bread crumbs and enough salt and pepper to season spicily.
- With this mixture fill the tomato shells, dot over the top buttered crumbs and bake in a quick oven until nicely browned.

CANADA NOW IN LIME LIGHT

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Canada is in the lime light. In the realm of publicity the Dominion never before had such prominence. This is due largely to the extended news service reflecting the life of the country.

The Prince of Wales as a Canadian rancher, Lord Byng, Governor General of Canada as an optometrist, and Lord Birkenhead, former British Lord Chancellor, as prophet in the Dominion, have given a fillip to publicity affecting Canada. A prophecy by Lord Birkenhead as to Canada's great development has been widely published here, but it is recognized that the greatest prophet of all is now crossing the Atlantic in the person of Lloyd George.

It is expected that the former British Premier will render great service to Canada as a medium of publicity. His tour in the Dominion will be watched with immense interest here. Although the number of speeches which Lloyd George will make will be limited there is little doubt that oratorically he will "deliver the goods."

His temperament is sensitive to environment and it is believed that he will receive from his Canadian surroundings the right inspiration. So man can speak successfully in a foreign land.

Since Lloyd George quitted the front bench in the House of Commons for the cool shade of opposition, he has experienced a draught and his utterances have not kindled the same warmth of feeling that he produced when, as Premier he dominated Parliament. Even in the country, except in his beloved Wales, his personality has lost some of its charm. Public favor, like the English climate, is variable, but the feeling exists that by some means he will find his way back to the seats of the mighty.

The possible effect in this direction of his present tour already is being discussed in this country.

Expect Interesting Speeches.

The political correspondent of the Sunday Times says it may easily have a large influence on his future career.

He says: "The new world sees him and his share in the war and in peace in greater detachment and truer perspective than we who are close to him and too susceptible to partisan passions for a fair appraisal. It would be rash and improper to anticipate its judgment, but it is impossible that in the reaction of the two worlds that judgment should go without having a large influence upon public opinion in this country."

Interesting speeches are expected from Lloyd George as well as pictorial representations of his tour. The moving picture artist had not yet arrived at the time Blondin made his great reputation walking a tight rope across Niagara Falls, but probably he will be there to record Lloyd George's longings at the Falls. It will not be surprising if the English people see moving pictures of the breezy former Premier standing by the Horseshoe Falls, impressed by nature's wonders.

There has been a tendency to criticize Lloyd George for taking a holiday when H. H. Asquith is launching his autumn campaign. The criticism, however, is not general because it is felt that no man more needs a change of scenery than Lloyd George. He will return to England soon enough for the political fray with new ideas and much information concerning another country in the Empire, "fit for heroes to live in."

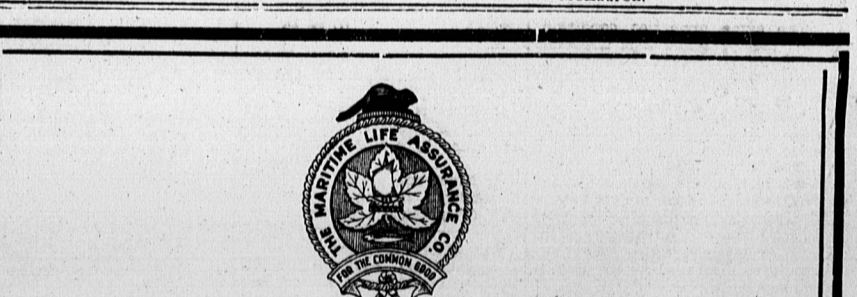
