MR. PROWSE REVIEWS FALCONWOOD INQUIRY

Continuing his analysis of the petition on which the Falconwood investigation was based, Mr. A. P. Prowse said:

Here is another sentence ordered by the same Mr. Johnston to be struck out.

"It is correct to say that you will be very much surprised upon hearing of the state of affairs out here, but if you are in earnest you will find us at your service ready to testify to the truth."

And again in five other places the words "Mr. Johnston" are directed by the same Mr. Johnston to be struck out.

Also the following was ordered by the same Mr. Johnston to be struck out, namely: "We understand that Dr. Goodwill was a Liberal and that fact may have some bearing on the matter."

Again the following was ordered by the same Mr. Johnston to be struck out: "Not through political prejudice." And again the words "without political influence" were ordered by the same Mr. Johnston to be struck out.

I also wish to direct your attention to the second last sentence in the document tabled on the 3rd day of April which reads as follows:

"We are confident that it will be of the highest interest to demand an investigation."

On referring to the document in question, you may notice the words "of the" are inserted in place of the words "to your" which were erased.

This change according to the testimony of Murphy was made after the document was delivered by Murphy to Mr. Johnston, or between the time it was handed by Murphy to Johnston and the time it was tabled.

The question arises who is guilty of making this change in the document, and why was it made.

It will be noted that quite a number of changes were made under the direction of Mr. Johnston made no doubt on the part of Mr. Johnston with the intention of removing any statement that had the appearance of party bias, but in giving the direction for the changes to be made the same person who was directing the other changes omitted to instruct Murphy to change the words "to your" to the words "of the" and seeing this omission the party directing the other changes must find some way of correcting this, as to leave the words "to your" would still show the party bias, consequently the change was made.

We now see from the foregoing that the document submitted to this House on the 3rd day of April was really the work of Murphy and Johnston.

The question may now arise why did not the hon. junior member for Cardigan table the document? It may be presumed that he considered he had performed his share in the political conspiracy, and some one else must be found that would be the pliant political tool to be bold enough to make the plunge. Therefore the lot fell upon the hon. junior member for West River to carry out the undesirable duty set for him, no doubt by mutual agreement.

Now as to the position of the Leader of the Opposition in this matter, I charge him with being equally guilty with the hon. junior member for West River and the hon. junior member for Cardigan, as he certainly must have been consulted before allowing his name to be used in addressing the document. The address reads: "To the Hon. Mr. Bell and the members of the Liberal party of Prince Edward Island."

Just imagine the Leader of the Opposition, representing the Liberal party in this province, whose duty it is to maintain a standard that should command the respect of the people of this province, allowing himself to become entrapped in a quadruple political conspiracy led by a poor deluded maniac. To my mind it is a sad spectacle to behold members of this House, representatives of a free and independent people degrading their position by resorting to such degrading tactics, resorting to the degrading low level of allowing themselves to be intriguants with the maniacal delusions of a regenerate, a person descending to such a depth of

moral depravity may to my mind be justly described as a machiavellian or a degraded politician of the machiavellian type, that is to say one who adheres to the principles that the end justifies the means. Follow this out to the lowest extremity as has been done in the case under review and you reach a standard that no self-respecting citizen would dare to uphold or endorse without at once taking the risk of being classed in the same low category.

At this stage it is, I consider, only fair to say that do not believe all the members of the Opposition are equally responsible in this nefarious "business" or for the position to which their leaders have brought them. In fact I know there is at least one member of the Opposition who knew nothing of that celebrated document until he heard it read in this House, and there may be others in the same position.

I hope and trust there is manhood and fairplay enough left in the other Liberal members of this House to censure in severe terms the members of their party who are responsible for the very unenviable position the Liberal party is now placed by those who have been weak enough to allow themselves to be so entrapped.

And to the members who were engaged in this political conspiracy and particularly to the hon. junior member for Cardigan, I would say that it would have been a great deal more to his credit had he for once at least been under consideration, but on the contrary to my mind, at least, they have descended so far down in the scale of political morality that they are unworthy of the confidence of their own party, much less the confidence of the people of the province.

I move the concurrence of this House in the Report of the Committee.

Mr. R. T. McLellan said that in rising to second the adoption of the report he wished to make a few remarks on the subject before the House. It was with trepidation that he arose after the scene that had been witnessed a few moments ago when the hon. member for Cardigan had charged the Speaker with lowering the dignity of his office and later also when the same gentleman had raised an objection to the hon. member for Murray Harbour reading his manuscript. The first time that he (Mr. McLellan) had had the honour of speaking in the House what he did say he read from manuscript and was taunted by the Leader of the Opposition. It was new at the business then and required something to guide him perhaps; but this evening whatever he might say he was going to read and trust not to Miss but to memory. He said it would be observed that the Report was signed by the majority of the Committee only. He understood that the minority Report would be submitted but the nature of it was not known. It had not been submitted to the majority of the Committee but he would not charge the minority with breach of faith as perhaps the time was short. As to the Report, he had no doubt whatever that both the House and the country would agree that the minority Report presented it in a very fair and moderate terms. He did not intend to go very fully into the matter. The session of the House had already been unduly prolonged, chiefly in consequence of the investigation. They all would remember the evening the charges were presented to the House and with what solemnity they were presented. The House and the people were given to understand that something terrible was transpiring at the Infirmary. If such charges were true the people would unquestionably be right in indignantly demanding an investigation. For this reason the investigation was granted and the Opposition were given the privilege of nominating the members who should represent them on the Committee. One of the newspapers had stated that it was rather unfair to pit two lawyers against three farmers. However, the matter had been fully investigated and he thought the ground had been covered. The allegation in the "Patriot" that the affairs of the Infirmary had not been enquired into was false, for every member of the Committee must admit that they had been given every opportunity to go into the matter and everything they had asked for had been granted. It was true that the Liberal members had sought to go to the management of the Asylum, but this was very properly denied them by the majority of the Committee as being beyond the scope of the investigation. The Opposition had been invited in the House, when the matter came up, to formulate and submit any charges they wished to make against the Asylum and they would be enquired into. If they had made specific charges against Falconwood Hospital those charges would have been gone into; but they did not make charges against the Asylum, and under cover of the enquiry into the affairs at the Infirmary, they endeavoured to squeeze in improperly questions relating to the Asylum, which was outside of the scope of the enquiry and beyond the authority of the Committee, and those questions were refused, which was the only thing that could be done. Mr. McLellan went on to read some of the evidence showed that a change had been made in the wording of the document since it had been placed in the hands of Mr. Johnston, and if Mr. Johnston did not make the change himself he must know who did.

Mr. HUGHES here stated that the alteration in the document was made by him and not Mr. Johnston, and he

took the full responsibility for the change. When the document was first read in the House some days ago he did not intend tabling it. He thought the words had a political significance and he changed them but the change was immaterial.

Mr. McLELLAN then proceeded to quote from the evidence again. There had been perhaps a few jarring notes in the evidence during the three days the Committee sat, but those who struck those jarring notes were not worthy of consideration. They had proved more than ordinary failures in life. Mr. McLellan then read the evidence of Mr. Bouneil, a man respected and admitted by all to be an efficient and trustworthy official, who had sworn that the conduct of the Infirmary was highly satisfactory, that Byrne was a first-rate attendant, that the food was of the very best and that Murphy was troublesome. He read also from the evidence of the Matron who gave Byrne an excellent character and denied the charges contained in the petition. McLellan read extracts from the evidence of other witnesses and in
