## Was Boy Father A Patriarch, 48 Urges Children

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 24. (CP)—Everybody should have children—they bring love into the home, said Noie Gable Fie, who at 48 has 10 children and 16 grandchildren. They call him a champion young grandfather.

Mr. Fie was married at 10 and was a father at 12. He admitted he didn't know what love was when he was first married, but when the first child was born he "couldn't keep away from the house," he said.

The first Mrs. Fie, whom he married when she was 12, died when he was 19. She told him to "go marry some good girl and keep the children together," and a month later he fulfilled her request.

Four children were born of the first union, five of the second. His second wife divorced him. He then married a widow with seven children, giving him 16 young ones to rear.

### Has Prospered

In turn a grocer, filling station man and cable proprietor, Mr. Fie recently retired to live off his "income" from investments with occasional work at the docks. One Christmas he fed turkey to 107 sons, daughters, in-laws, grandchildren and friends.

Says Grandfather Fie:—"My advice to boys and girls is to marry young. I was very young, of course, when I first married but it worked out all right."

"At 16 of our children—10 girls and six boys—are happily married. There have been no divorces among them. (He includes his step-children here.)

"When I raised the girls, I taught them to go to church and Sunday school as long as they were under my care and keeping."

"I taught them to take care of the house, so they could make themselves good wives. Every one of my girls can cook a good meal. We'd have better girls today if they were raised like mine."

### Strict With Girls

"My girls were not allowed to go to dances; if they wanted to ride home from church with boys they had to be chaperoned. When boys came calling on them they sat in the parlor with the window shades up. My father taught me that way and I taught them that. More families were raised like that there wouldn't be so much divorce."

"One of my girls married when she was only 11; another was married another 12. That speaks pretty well for young marriages, doesn't it?"

## Lou Salica Takes Title For Bantamweights

NEW YORK, Sept. 24—(AP)—Lou Salica, New York, cleared up the muddled bantamweight situation tonight and became sole owner of the world's 113-pound championship by outpointing George Pace of Cleveland in 15 rounds at the Bronx Coliseum. Salica weighed 117 1/2, Pace 118.

Outboxing the little Cleveland negro all the way Salica regained the crown he won in 1935 from Sixto Escobar and lost the same year to the same fighter.

Thus, for the first time in a year, the division has only one titleholder. Escobar abdicated the throne a year ago and Pace was given recognition as champion by the National Boxing Association, while Salica was recognized as the New York State titlist by the State Athletic Commission. The two fought a draw for the title last March in Toronto.

### GOES THROUGH AIR IN PLEASANT EAST

LONDON, Sept. 22—(CP)—This is the story of a Royal Air Force pilot who made a parachute jump in action. Bailing out is common enough in these days of bitter aerial warfare but when the officer told of it his language was so vivid that listeners almost felt that they were floating down with him.

His plane was shot down and a bullet pierced his foot when his ammunition gave out while he attacked three Messerschmitts over the sea following an earlier battle in which he sent a German fighter down in flames. So nonchalantly did he take his descent that he lit a cigarette while floating down. But let him tell it.

"It was a pleasant sensation. I was in mid-air—floating down so peacefully in the cool breeze. I had to remind myself to pull my ripcord and open my parachute. When the first jerk came over I swung like a pendulum. This was not so pleasant but I soon settled down and I was able to enjoy a full view of the world below—the beach some miles away with soldiers at the line of villas in a coastal town.

### Nazi Held Off

"There was no sensation of speed. But the ripples on the water became bigger. The soldiers on the beach came nearer. I had one minute of anxiety. As I floated down one of the Messerschmitts appeared. The pilot circled round me and I was just a little alarmed. Would he shoot? Well—he didn't. He behaved quite well. He opened his hood, waved to me and then dived towards the sea and made off towards France.

"The wind was still friendly. It was carrying me in towards the beach. I took out my cigarettes and lit one with my lighter—without any difficulty. Ages seemed to pass. I threw away the cigarette as I came nearer to the coast. I could hear the all-clear sirens—and passing over the houses on the sea front I could see the people coming out of their shelters—people looking up at me.

"I had descended to about 1,000 feet. I began to sway a little and I could hear my parachute flapping—like the sound of a sail in a small boat. The soldiers' faces were quite clear but I must have looked English even at 1,000 feet—which was comforting.

"For the first time since the pilot circled around me I became anxious. Was I to end my escapade by being banged against a seaside villa? It did not seem possible that I could reach the beach beyond.

"The journey ended in a comfortable frame after I had pushed myself free of a house with my foot."

**COURT OF INQUIRY**

CALGARY, Sept. 24—(CP)—A military court of inquiry is sitting at the civilian Internment camp at Kananaskis investigating the circumstances which led to the escape of two German prisoners on Sunday. Brig. C. E. Conroy, officer commanding military district No. 13, announced here today.

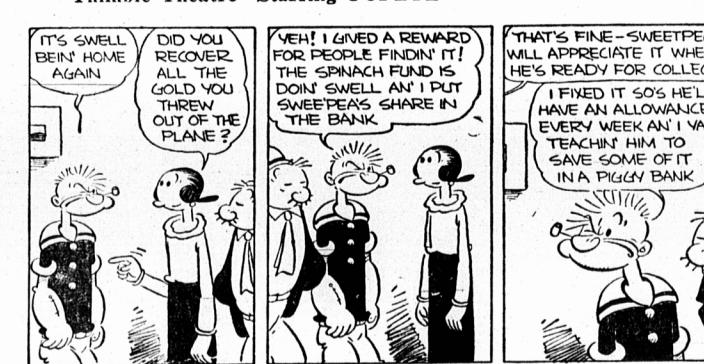

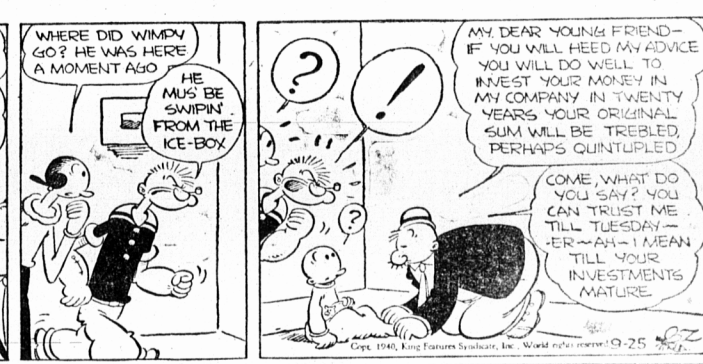
